Nyssa can well be proud of its American Legion post that is gaining statewide recognition for its versatile activities and its tremendous membership increase.

Veteran's Day will be observed in Nyssa this year with all retail stores and most service businesses remaining closed for the first time in several years. Through the efforts of Legion Commander Harold Brendle, all business firms asked were willing to dispense with business that day even though they knew that some firms in neighboring towns may attempt to profiteer on the holiday.

Unsuccessful efforts to have stores close in past years have been due to "kicking over the traces" in other towns of the valley even though previous agreements to close had been made.

Reports are that one of the biggest parades of its kind in the history of Malheur county will tour Nyssa, Adrian, Ontario and Vale Nov. 11 with seven bands to add lots of color to the marching veterans of three wars.

Post 79 has set a record in Oregon for exceeding by 210 percent its 1956 quota in the membership drive. No organization can attract new members simply by persuading them "it's the thing to do." Worthwhile activities and projects are necessary to keep such a group alive. It has been noted for some time that Nyssa post's interests extend far beyond the scope of veteran's affairs and into innumerable civic activities beneficial to the entire community.

Along with bouquets to the Nyssa post and its commander, a big red poppy should be tossed to Fred E. Bennett, district commander, who is doing a tremendous job throughout the county in keeping alive the interest in the American Legion.

It goes without saying that Don M. Graham, a veteran of four conflicts under two flags, who has devoted a large part of his civilian life to veteran's affairs and in giving assistance to individuals and their needs, is deserving of much credit for a successful American Legion.

Catholic Church To Present 24 Lecture Series

Beginning on Tuesday, Nov. 5, St. Hubert's Catholic Church in Nyssa will present a series of informational lectures covering the fundamentals, doctrines of faith, morals and religious rituals. Topics to be covered in the series of twenty-four lectures will include the following: Attitude of the Catholic church towards the Bible; marriage legislation of the Catholic church; the sacraments; the mass; confession; dogmas; holy water; is the church totalitarian? etc.

The purpose of these talks is to give a clear exposition of the teachings of the Catholic church; there will be no controversial talks, no attacks on any other christian denomination. There are no traps, no brain washings to bring anyone into the Catholic church. No one is received into the church before he or she is thoroughly instructed and, then and only then, freely asks to be received.

An invitation to attend these lectures or "Inquirers' Class" is extended to non-Catholics and Catholics alike. There will be no admission fees; no collections; no obligations whatsoever.

Questions may be asked, either publicly or privately, at the conclusion of each lecture.

The lectures will last for one hour only: from 8 to 9 p. m. on Tuesdays, beginning with Nov. 5, and will be held at St. Hubert's church, 3rd and Park in Nyssa. A cordial invitation is given to all who wish correct information on the centuries old institution, the Catholic church.

Because these talks follow a logical sequence, it is suggested that those interested be sure to attend the first one next Tuesday night. Anyone, however, is free to attend as few or as many classes as he likes.
