During the month of October over 200 friends visited the garden of Mrs. Maurice Judd, viewing the chrysanthemums in full bloom.

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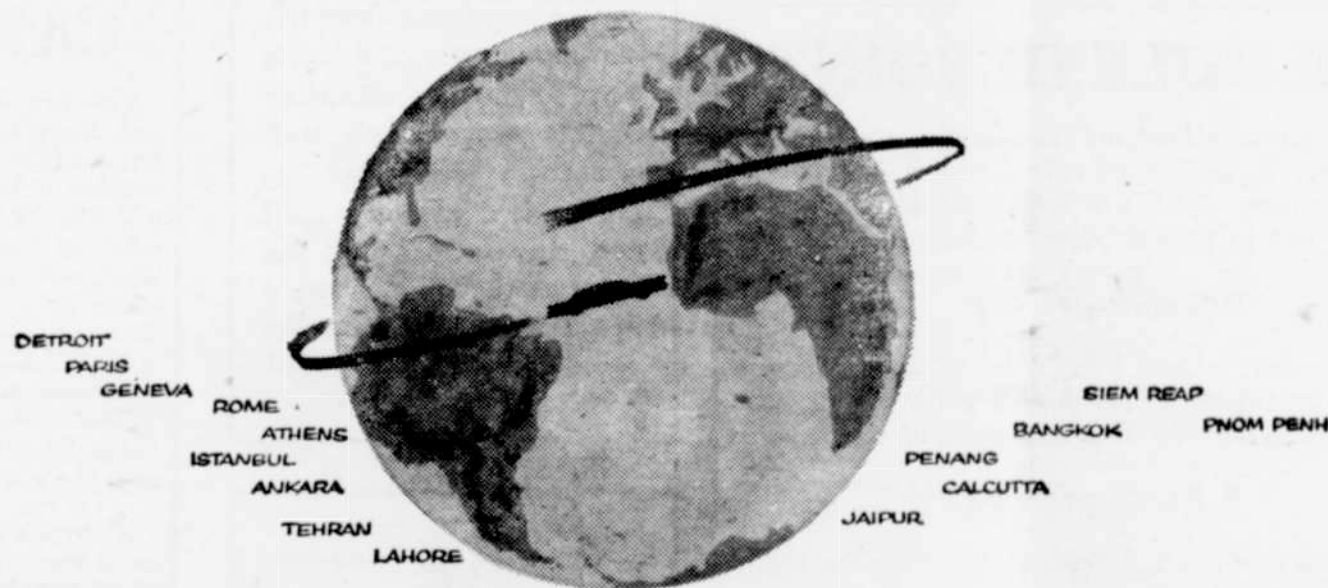
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Mrs. Haney Honored With Stork Shower
