10 Years Ago—Oct. 23, 1947

Mr. and Mrs. Rodda have closed the Nyssa Coffee Shop with the expectation that the building will be used for a Marshall-Wells store. The operators have taken a lease from Frank T. Morgan and Andy Collier — Dr. C. M. Tyler formerly of Ontario, announced the opening of a dental office over Wilsons store in the former office of Dr. E. D. Norcott — An egg within an egg was brought to the Journal office by Mrs. J. B. Mitchell, Nyssa, route 1. The first shell contained just the egg white and in place of the yolk was another egg enclosed in a regular shell.

15 Years Ago—Oct. 22, 1922

The Farm Security group will take over the CCC camp southwest of Nyssa to be used for harvest workers — Nyssa schools were closed again due to labor needs. The high school had been closed for two weeks to enable students to work in harvest fields and was closed again Tuesday when only 50 percent of the students reported for classes, Supt. Henry Hartley said when school re-opened Monday. Some of the girls are even topping beets, which is a difficult task. Most of the boys are also working in the beet fields according to Frank Parr, high school principal, who has organized the crews.

20 Years Ago—Oct. 21, 1917

L. L. Patterson of Newell Heights sold his 40-acre farm to George Neim and the 80-acre farm of R. Connell was sold to J. B. Davis — Lt. Elmer Clon-926th CCC company of Nyssa, was transferred to Camp Alexander Flats in southern Idaho—

The Owyhee Project Irrigation offices are now in their new location at First and Good Avenue — Robert E. Long, U. S. Biological trapper, set an all time record for one month in Oregon when he caught 244 coyotes, and 12 bob cats.

30 Years Ago—Oct. 21, 1927

The O. H. Schweizer home and the Owyhee school house were wired for electric lights by the Idaho Power Co. this week — Mrs. Frank Morgan and 10-day old son returned Thursday from the Holy Rosary hospital — Mrs. Frank Newton and Mrs. J. B. Smith are the happy owners of new ABC Spinners, the last word in washing machines — About 100 Portland business men visited Nyssa Wednesday. The group arrived on a special train and were met at the depot by Nyssa business men who took them on an auto tour of the Owyhee project.

35 Years Ago—Oct. 20, 1922

Don Davis, traveling salesman for an eastern firm, returned home Monday after an absence of over a year — The first real rain of the season fell here last week — Eddie Powell, manager of the Service Garage announces another reduction of \$50 on the price of Ford cars, making the total cost \$488 delivered at Nyssa.

Eastern Oregon Council Planned By Scout Leaders

More and better Girl Scout activities will be available to girls of Malheur county if present plans of Girl Scout leaders in this area are realized, according to Mrs. Clifford Fox of Nyssa. These plans call for the organization of a Girl Scout council with central headquarters to handle all Girl Scout needs throughout the six eastern Oregon counties.

Months of planning and study have gone into the possibilities of forming such a council with the idea of providing eastern Oregon girls first rate camping facilities and more abundant professional advice.

Mrs. Fox pointed out that although Girl Scouting as a movement is 45 years old, as a solid organization it is still in its infancy in eastern Oregon. Most of the Girl Scouts in these six Oregon counties operate as lone troops. Only four of the larger towns have Girl Scout "councils" which make efforts toward leader training and other requirements of Girl Scouting.

Mrs. Ralph McEwen of Baker, elected head of the area planning group, says that at the present time only three girls in 18 are getting Girl Scout training in the eastern Oregon counties.

The eastern Oregon area development committee points out that a Girl Scout council for this locality would provide girls from seven to 17 with a better program, better camping, better troop organization, more new troops and better leader training. Counties involved in the proposed council are Malheur, Harney, Baker, Grant, Union and Wallawa. When the council plans are approved a central headquarters will be set up with a professional worker available to give full-time Girl Scout assistance to this area.

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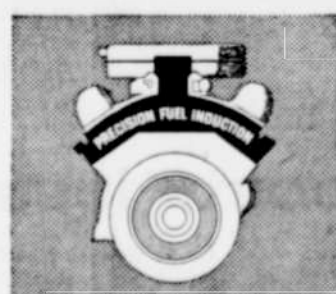

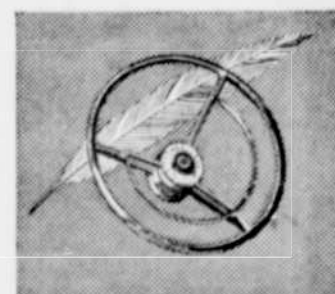
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
