Nyssa Bulldogs Trounce Emmett 20-0, Sew Up Second Place in SRV Play

After a slow, scoreless first half, the Nyssa Bulldogs came alive to beat the visiting Emmett Huskies 20-0 Friday night on Nyssa's field and clinch second place in SRV play. The Bulldogs turned in two long runs, one of them in the last half-minute of play. Nyssa's first touchdown came at the end of a 63 yard drive with Dennis Savage going over from the 5 after he took a desperation pitch out from Quarterback John Messick. Gale Coleman plunged over the extra point.

In the fourth quarter, Nyssa got away their two long touchdown runs, one by Dennis Savage and the other by Larry Roberts. Savage went 63 yards off-tackle to send Nyssa ahead 3-0 in the opening minutes of the final period. Later, with only 30 seconds left to play, John Messick threw a short pass to Larry Roberts who scampered 40 yards to paydirt on a beautiful piece of broken fieldrunning.

First Half Scoreless

Emmett threw up a strong defense against Nyssa and the local eleven was unable to score during the first half.

Near the end of the first half, Nyssa put on a drive that ended on the Emmett 1 yard line, but there the Huskies held the Bulldogs.

By the same token, the Bulldogs showed themselves to be tough on the defense, never allowing the Huskies to penetrate deeper than the Nyssa 34 yard line.

Three times in the first half, the Bulldogs threatened, but each time they were stopped. In the first quarter a 15-yard penalty stopped a drive which had previously gone to the 19. In the second quarter, the Bulldogs got down to the 10 yard line, where they again lost the ball. With only 50 seconds left in the first half, the Bulldogs again put on a drive. This time, they had first and goal on the 9 yard line, but once again the Huskies stopped them, this time on the 1 yard line.

Bulldogs Held Well

In the meantime, the Bulldogs held the Huskies without difficulty. The deepest penetration of the Emmett eleven was their own 40 yard line.

In the middle of the third quarter, the Bulldogs hit paydirt for the first time. Messick, attempting to skirt left end was trapped and pitched out to Savage just as he went down for the score.

After that, it was Nyssa all the way. Emmett was forced to punt soon after they received the kickoff, and on the second play from scrimmage, Savage found a hole and turned it into a 63 yard touchdown jaunt. John Messick received a short pass from Coleman for the extra point. Toward the end of the ball game, Nyssa recovered a fumble on the Emmett 49 yard line. On the first play, Messick threw a short pass to Roberts who rumbled 40 more yards for Nyssa's final TD. The conversion attempt failed.

Nyssa Man Guilty Of City Charges, Pays \$25 and Costs

Richard Strasbaugh, Nyssa construction worker and former gravel company operator, was found guilty of public intoxication, disorderly conduct and resisting arrest in municipal court last Thursday. Police Judge J. C. Smith fined the defendant \$50 plus court costs and suspended \$25 of the fine.

The charges stemmed from Strasbaugh's arrest by Nyssa police about 2 a. m. Oct. 22. He had entered a plea of not guilty before Judge Smith Oct. 23.

The two hour and 45 minute trial, less about 10 minutes for a recess, saw the appearance of four prosecution witnesses. Only Strasbaugh testified on his own behalf. Justice of the Peace Don Graham was called as a defense witness but the court sustained City Attorney Harold Henigson's objection that Judge Graham's testimony was not relevant to these charges.

Ten sticks of Dynamite Found

The arresting officer, Clem De Vinaspre, was the first prosecution witness. During his testimony regarding a scuffle with Strasbaugh on the steps of the Owyhee hotel and his subsequent arrest, the city attorney submitted as evidence 10 sticks of 22 month old dynamite and a large heavy bolt taken from Strasbaugh at that time.

Three other prosecution witnesses, Mrs. Virginia Mitchell and Mrs. LuDean Blodgett, both waitresses at Brownie's cafe, and Miss Joanne Zinn, Gate City Journal society editor, all testified to the defendant's whereabouts and appearance about 1 a. m. Oct. 22.

In Strasbaugh's testimony, which differed sharply with that of the prosecution witnesses in places, he told of his activities the night of his arrest. He explained he had picked up the dynamite found in his possession around midnight Oct. 21 when he had gone to the gravel pit he had operated to drain the water from several engines there. He also testified he had waved one of these sticks of dynamite at officer De Vinaspre on the steps of the Owyhee hotel.

Judge Smith reported that Strasbaugh had previously appeared before him on Sept. 25. He pleaded guilty to disorderly conduct and profane language charges at that time and was fined \$50.

Employment Tests Offered by State To School Seniors

Testing of senior Nyssa high next year will be conducted at school students who plan to work the school tomorrow by Horace Arment, manager of the State Employment service in Ontario, Principal Jack Jenkins has announced.

All seniors who plan to enter the labor market after graduation or who have not made definite plans to attend college will participate in the testing and counseling. The tests, undertaken by the state employment office in cooperation with the U.S. Employment service, will include a general aptitude test battery and are designed to assist the students in vocational choices.

Jenkins said he feels these meetings with state employment representatives are particularly important to the students in that they offer a realistic approach to vocational counseling.

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Antelopes Near Grid Season's End, Run Away from Fruitland 51 to 21

The Adrian Antelopes, starting from the opening kickoff, ran up a resounding 51 to 21 defeat over the Fruitland eleven Friday night.

Adrian received the opening kickoff and on the first play, a pass from Phil Hatch to Jim Thompson, moved the ball from their own 40 to Fruitland's 25. A few plays later Henry Mendazona scored from the six. The extra point try failed.

Adrian made their second six points just a few moments later on a pass from Hatch to Thompson, and Kay cleverly plunged for the extra point.

In the second quarter a pass from Hatch to Hartley was good for six points. Then another pass from Hatch, this time to James McKinley, added the additional point. After Fruitland received the Antelope kick off they attempted a pass, but Hatch intercepted it and ran 25 yards for their third TD.

Fruitland Fumble Costly

After ensuing Adrian kickoff off Fruitland fumbled on the first play and David Foster scooped up the ball, running 30 yards to mark up the Antelopes' fourth trip across the goal line. Hartley plunged for the extra point.

Fruitland found Adrian's goal line next when Sager rounded end and traveled 70 yards. Hutchinson added the point after.

Finally receiving another kickoff, the Antelopes took over on their own 40. And, on the first play, Brent Hartley raced 60 yards to mark up another Adrian score. The half ended with Adrian ahead 39 to 7.

Fruitland started off the third quarter with Sager going 15 yards to give them their TD and Cross successfully converted. However, Adrian came right back with Jim Webster going six yards to the Antelopes total.

Run For 95 Yards Scores

After the kickoff and a penalty put Fruitland on their own five yard line, Cross broke loose around the end and traveled all 95 yards against the Adrian reserves. Cross again converted.

The final points in the high scoring game came on a pass from Adrian's Hatch to Thompson. Adrian marked up 17 first downs to 12 for Fruitland.

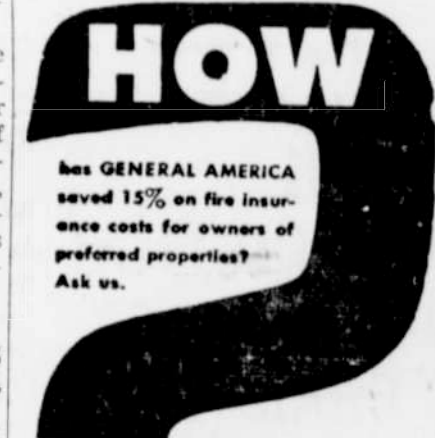


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
