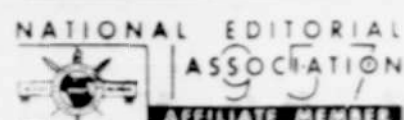

Long Session May Be Necessary

Oregon's current administrative policies could easily set this state up as one of the most ridiculous of the nation's 48, not withstanding Alabama and its governor's antics.

No credit to the ideals of good statesmanship was the regular session of the legislature last winter when squabbling, deceit and building of political ladders superceded good government. The special session, now in deadlock, is even less statesmanlike.

We believe Gov. Robert D. Holmes is entirely responsible for the mess. Time was when we believed—and so stated editorially—that Gov. Holmes was sincere in his beliefs. We have changed our mind. The governor has too many times attempted to place the blame for high income taxes and all other shortcomings of his administration on others than himself. His accusations that the tax commission of the previous administration is guilty of inaccurate monetary reports is as phoney as a three dollar bill in view of the fact that it is one of the few departments the governor did not see fit to replace.

To demand a \$50 million "cushion" made up of the people's money is without moral responsibility. What would Gov. Holmes say if a private utility should collect far more than its just rate and divide the excess profits among its stockholders as the governor proposes to do among the vast accumulation of tax-hungry state bureaus whose appetites are never satisfied?

Gov. Holmes in a campaign speech right here in Nyssa promised more economy in state government and expanded state services, which even a school boy knows cannot be fulfilled simultaneously. Instead of accomplishing either objective, state taxes have gone up like a Sputnik and state service—unless you call bureaucratic meddling service—is at an even lower ebb than it was under the long-entrenched Republican domination.

We hope the 15 Republicans and two Democrat senators stand pat until doom's day on their denial for a 30 percent income tax reduction. They are right in their contention that the people's money is being used indiscriminately.

We believe a majority of the people are sick and tired of the theory of spend, spend, spend and tax, tax, tax.
