10 Years Ago—Oct. 30, 1947

Gov. Snell and Sec. Farrell were killed in a plane crash near Klamath Falls when the plane struck a hillside during inclement weather. 15 Years Ago—Oct. 29, 1942

Dwight Wyckoff and Harold Boyles who have been employed at Hawthorne, Nev., have enlisted in the Navy. — The school board of school district No. 5 voted at a meeting Thursday, to re-open Nyssa high school Nov. 2, regardless of the labor situation. However the peak of the harvest is expected to be reached at that time. About 240 students, both boys and girls, are working in the beet, potato, lettuce and hay fields. — Rationing of coffee will be started in the U. S. Nov. 28, at the rate of one pound for each person over 15 years old, every five weeks.

20 Years Ago—Oct. 28, 1937

The Amalgamated Sugar Company started pouring cement Wednesday for the construction of a 60,000 bag capacity warehouse. — A federal pure foods inspector was in Nyssa this week inspecting the local drug stores for the deadly elixir of sulfanilamide which has been responsible for many deaths recently. Neither of the drug stores had any of the stock on hand. — Frank T. Morgan was elected president of the Oregon Reclamation Congress at a recent convention held in Portland.

30 Years Ago—Oct. 28, 1927

Main street in Nyssa presented an animated appearance this week with a number of teams and a crew of men busy on street improvement work. Their activities have resulted in the disappearance of the trees on First street. — Dewey Ray returned from Los Angeles this week where he had chaperoned a couple of cars of stock, in the nature of an experiment for a new market but is not pleased with the result. He was 6½ days enroute and lost by shrinkage was heavy. Besides Dewey got lost in the city and rode the street cars for half a day before he located himself.

35 Years Ago—Oct. 27, 1922

Whether or not big, and potentially powerful India can stand solidly on its own feet now that it has had a period of several years of going it alone, free of English dominance, will be told to members of the Malheur County Knife and Fork club when they meet Saturday, Nov. 16 at Eastside cafe with Dr. Haridas T. Muzumdar, who has just returned from Asia and Africa.

Dr. Muzumdar, born in India, and a friend and biographer of the late Mahatma Gandhi went to India, Pakistan and Africa last summer at the request of the Associated Clubs, parent organization of the network to which the local club belongs. There he studied social, political and economic conditions and it is on those facets of life that he will report.

Schooled in India and a graduate of Bombay University, Muzumdar holds degrees also from American universities. For the past few years he has been in the midwest, his trip to Asia stemming from Mt. Vernon, Iowa, home of Cornell College, where he was a faculty member.

Biographies of Grace Wilson Vanderbilt and Henry M. Stanley, ideas for farmers, assorted novels and other works went into circulation at the Malheur County Library, Nov. 2.

Queen of the Golden Age, by Corneliu Vanderbilt, Jr., is the story of a fabulous era in which the author's mother ruled for a half-century the society world of New York and Newport.

Dr. Livingstone, I Presume? by Ian Anstruther is the biography of Henry M. Stanley who gained fame with this famous greeting upon finding the missionary explorer in Africa, but whose exploits there after were plagued by ridicule and bitterness.

Farm Manual, published by Popular Mechanics Press, contains hundreds of profitable ideas for farmers on stepping up efficiency, increasing production, and saving time, labor, and money.

Home Before Dark, by Eileen Bassing, relates the story of a young woman recovering from a mental breakdown who fights a losing battle for self-control until her eyes are finally opened to the cause of her trouble.

O Western Wind, by John Devon is a novel built around the first years in Plymouth Colony, in which a feud begun in Cornwall over the hand of a flirtatious girls continues in the new world.

Sushila, by Graham McInnes, is the story of India and of a young woman, daughter of a successful marriage between a Hindu and an American woman, who has a consuming passion to become a great artist.

A Distant Drum, by Charles Flood concerns the generation that found the Korean War its responsibility, and is told through the eyes of a young Harvard graduate who gradually gains maturity.

Your Child's Speech, by Flora Schreiber is a practical guide for parents on the development of a child's speech until he has mastered the fundamentals approximately in his fifth year.

The Legacy of Holmes and Brandeis, by Samuel Konefsky is a study in the influence of ideas, comparing the constitutional philosophies of two eminent Supreme Court jurists of our Century and the fate of their distinctive thought at the hands of their disciples and interpreters.
