

### Malheur Auditor Indicted Again By Grand Jury

An indictment was returned against County Auditor Don Hosler by a Malheur county grand jury last Thursday charging him with unauthorized compensation for performance of official duties.

Hosler had been charged with receiving \$50 voted him by the county court in May of 1936 for services in connection with the building of the Malheur Nursing home in Vale.

According to District Attorney E. Otis Smith, Hosler had been previously indicted in August but the circuit court had quashed that charge on the grounds it had been improperly drawn.

#### Not True Bill Returned

In other grand jury action last Thursday a not true bill was returned against Ned Wise of Ontario who had been charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor and Dwain Courtney was indicted for negligent homicide in the death of Mrs. Myro Guthberlet of Weiser. Her death resulted from an auto-truck accident north of Ontario in which Courtney was driving the truck.

#### Indictments Resubmitted

Five indictments for manslaughter against Richard D. Newlan, 29-year-old Payette bartender, also were ordered resubmitted to the grand jury Tuesday, according to Smith, on a motion of the district attorney.

Newlan was being tried in Circuit Judge M. A. Biggs' court and the judge had ruled that one indictment was defective in respect to the charge of manslaughter. Smith told the court he could prove the charge of manslaughter on all five counts and asked that the indictments be sent back to the grand jury.

On the program for next week will be Gus Liming, serving as toastmaster; the Rev. Paul Ludlow, topicmaster; Cliff Main, critic; Bill Marostica, grammarian, and Ralph Lawrence and Walter McPartland, five minute speakers.

Peutz arrived in Payette Feb. 18th and immediately went to work on a farm for \$1.00 a day so he could repay the \$100 his brother had sent him. After two years of farm work he went to work in a Payette flour mill at the increased wages of \$3.00 a day.

#### House, Barn Still in Use

Then in August of 1909 he made that trip to Nyssa to look at the Pinkston place, 80 acres of homesteaded land, with only 30 acres under cultivation, on the present road to Owyhee dam. A house and a rock barn, both still in use today, occupied the homestead with Mr. Pinkston having hauled the lumber for the house by horse and wagon from a mill in Tribrook, Idaho.

Bill Peutz returned to Payette and during the next six months he bought the Pinkston ranch and made preparations for moving to the Nyssa area.

#### Peutz Marries

On Nov. 17th, 1909 he married Emma Michaelsen in Payette. March 10th, 1910, Peutz and his bride of four months loaded their worldly goods into a buck board and, with three horses, journeyed to their new ranch. They made the trip from Payette in a single day and felt they made pretty good time.

Peutz and his wife started in the cattle and ranching business with a single cow and by raising alfalfa and grain on his 30 tillable acres to sell to the sheepmen in the winter months. The other 50 acres of the ranch were composed of "sand hills and gopher mounds." Irrigation came from the old Owyhee ditch, and, as Peutz recalls, ditches on his place were so full of gopher holes they wouldn't hold water.

#### Gopher Holes Present Problem

Many times the new ranch owner and his bride took turns, each working half of the night, pounding closed the ever-increasing gopher holes and trying to get the ditches to carry the water onto the land.

During the winters the roads to Nyssa were so bad horses couldn't pull a wagon through them, so Peutz regularly walked the 10 miles to town with the butter his wife made to sell. On the return trip he packed groceries back to the ranch in a sack.

He adds that he was certainly glad to see the Homedale railroad line laid in 1913 because he then could hike to town on the comparatively dry railroad bed rather than having to slog through the muddy roads.

At that time, before reclamation, it was only a mile from Peutz's house into the sage brush. Much of his time in those days was spent leveling and developing the 50 acres of his ranch that were not farmable.

#### First Son Born

March 22nd, 1912 the couple's first son, Werner, was born. Two more sons followed. Lawrance was born March 21, 1917 and William, Jr., on March 6th, 1919. All three boys attended Owyhee school and the Nyssa high school. Lawrance was the first volunteer for the Army from this county during World War II. During his time in the service he was disabled. Sons Werner and William, Jr., are now farming the Peutz ranch which has grown to 120

acres, all of which is under cultivation.

Grand Father Peutz now boasts of a newer addition to this family, too, a granddaughter, Wanda.

During his nearly 48 years in the Nyssa area, Bill Peutz has been a member of the Lutheran church, he served for a great many years on the old Owyhee Ditch board, and he was a member of the Owyhee school board for over 25 years. What's more, he adds, he's been a Gate City Journal subscriber since March of 1910.

Mrs. Bothamley is enroute home after attending a national Girl Scout convention held last week at Philadelphia. She attended as a delegate from the Los Angeles, district.

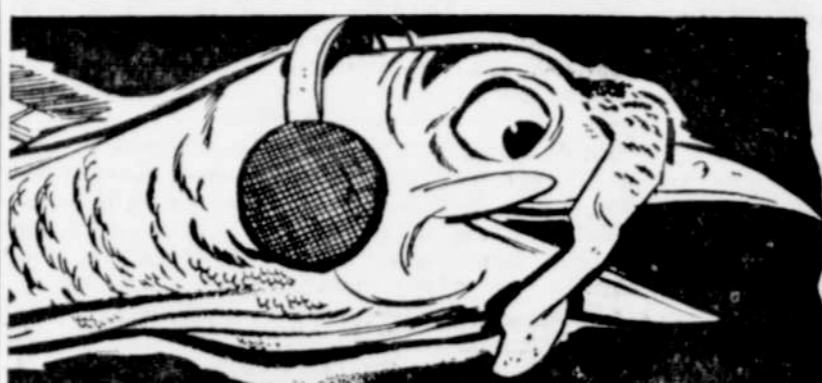
