Rep. Emil Stunz Reports Progress Of Special State Legislative Session

With the third week of this special session of the state legislature beginning, it is hoped that the conferees will reach an agreement in their search for a tax reduction before this week has passed. HB No. 1, the tax reduction bill, which was amended by the Senate and now contains practically all of the bi-partisan bill which I explained to you last week, passed the Senate last Thursday and was sent over to the house of representatives which voted to not concur with the senate's amendments. A conference committee was appointed, which consists of two senators, Pearson and Wilhelm, Portland, and two representatives, Jonas of Salem and chairman of the house taxation committee, Clarence Barton of Coquille. These appointments are made by the president of the senate and the speaker of the house.

A progress on tax cut the house conferees represent a program supported by the governor and all but three of the Democratic house members, while the senate view point is that of the 15 Republicans who have been joined by the Democrats. The senate Republican-Democratic coalition have insisted from the start that the taxes should be decreased more than the house Democrats want. They started with a demand for 35% and have now dropped to a 30% reduction.

The Governor's first announcement was for a 6 or 7% decrease. He has raised to a 10% decrease at the Democratic caucus which was held a week before the session started. Thursday the house

conferees offered to go up to 15%. So it does seem safe to predict that some progress is being made. Any action of a conference committee must be approved by both the house and the senate, and the governor must approve and sign the bill before it becomes a law.

Other Bills Studied

Three attempts have been made by some of the house members to bring out of the house rules committee the senate approved bill which would abolish the states right to levy a property tax. A vote of two thirds of the house, or 40 votes, is needed to take a bill away from the committee. We failed to muster enough votes to bring this bill to the floor.

Other senate passed bills which have not received consideration by the house are SB No. 4, which relates to over-lapping of school district and SB No. 13, relating to rural fire districts.

SB No. 17, relating to refunds of motor fuel taxes to road districts has been read the first time and is in the senate rules committee. Senator Yturri and I decided to introduce this bill in the senate where we believed it would receive more favorable consideration from the rules committee than if we had introduced it in the house, in which case it would have been referred to the house rules committee.
