

Former Nyssan Dies at Home In Fruitland

George Dewey Blunk, 59, of Fruitland, former Nyssa resident, died at his home Sunday. Mr. Blunk suffered a heart attack Aug. 29 at which time he was hospitalized in the Holy Rosary hospital in Ontario.

He was born May 30, 1890, at Delphos, Iowa, and came to Nyssa in 1946 and operated a service station on the corner of Second and Main. In 1955 the Blunk family moved to Fruitland where he was operating a gas station until the time of his death.

Mr. Blunk was a member of the First Christian church at Fruitland.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Louisa A. Blunk, Fruitland; two sons, Geo. of Marshalltown, Iowa, and HM/3 G. W.
