

State Commission Sells Game Farm For \$35,110.50

The Ontario game farm has been sold, according to an announcement by the Oregon State Game commission. A check with the county clerk's office shows the 80-acre property was sold to Robert Walter Nusom and wife and Jack Dillard Sather and wife for \$35,110.50.

Bids were accepted on the game farm up until Sept. 5 of this year. The game commission had set a minimum price of \$26,000 on the 80-acre farm.

The Hermiston farm, now producing chukar partridge and quail, will be in full pheasant production next year, the game commission says, with some 12,000 to 15,000 reared annually to be released in all eastern Oregon counties. They say there will be no reduction in the number of pheasants released as a result of the Ontario game farm sale.

The Ontario farm was constructed in 1937 and began production in 1938 and had a yearly average of 12,099 pheasants. Open field rearing was used throughout. Incubation and brooding at Hermiston is by mechanical methods in a modern efficient facility.

According to the department, facilities at the farm had depreciated to a point where complete replacement was required for efficient operation. In addition, they said, setting hens used in the old production methods were becoming increasingly difficult to obtain.

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Trash Fish Cleared From Trout Stream

Last week, Bob Borovicka, coordinating fishery biologist, Ellis Mason and Vic Case, game agents for the southeast region, and Larry Bisbee, fishery agent who headed the project, converged on Crooked creek in the remote Jordan Valley country for the first step in the rehabilitation of this once good trout producer.

Some four days of work was required by Bisbee and his crew to treat the stream from its source to an impassable falls just above its confluence with the Owyhee river, a total distance of some 10 miles. About 70 gallons of liquid and 150 pounds of powdered rotenone were used in the treatment. The stream had become overrun with chiselmouth chub, dace, red-sided shiner and suckers.

Crooked creek, tributary to the Owyhee river near Rome, meanders through meadowlands for 10 or 12 miles, then through a short canyon where it empties into the upper Owyhee.

Bisbee described the treatment as a successful one and said the stream would be restocked with cutthroat trout.
