Nazarene Church Launches Golden Anniversary Year

The Nyssa Church of the Nazarene was among the 4,500 congregations of the international Protestant church that held special watch night services around the world New Year's eve opening the denomination's golden anniversary.

The Rev. Robert O. Jackson, pastor of the Nyssa Nazarene church, announced that special worship services Sunday, Jan. 5, would also be held in observance of the anniversary simultaneously in Nazarene churches in the U.S. and around the world.

Since the Nazarene church started at a union service in a small tent at Pilot Point, Tex., Oct. 13, 1908, it has become one of the fastest growing Protestant churches in the world.

A strong missionary emphasis continues from the church's early days. The church foreign program now has 341 full-time missionaries engaged in 33 world areas.

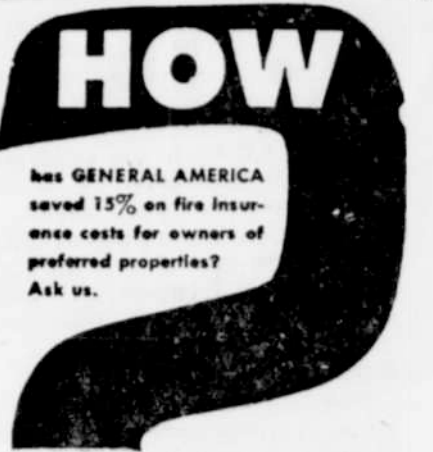
