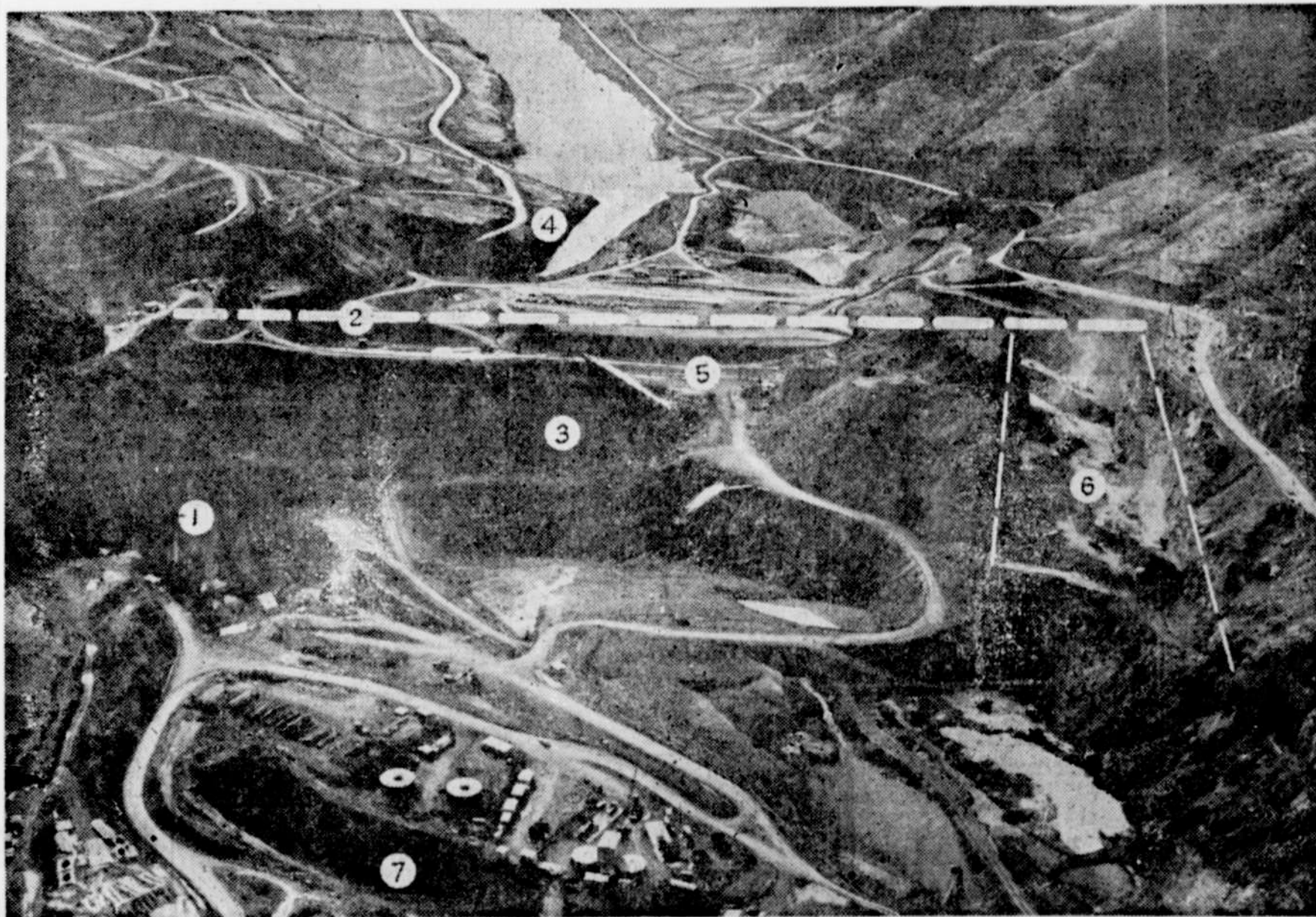

Brownlee Hydroelectric Project Will Be Completed In 1958

To Spark the Progress of a Growing Area*



In the Snake River Valley of Southern Idaho and Eastern Oregon, the growth of industry, agriculture and business, together with new homes and an expanding standard of living, has required ever greater quantities of electric power.

As a measure of that growth, Idaho Power Company is supplying its customers more than four times as much electricity as was required just over 10 years ago.

The Brownlee project, the first and largest of three being built in the Hells Canyon reach of Snake River, will be completed in 1958. Eighteen hundred workers are on the job around the clock, and construction work is on schedule.

Expenditures at Brownlee, for preliminary work on the Oxbow project and for related transmission facilities have already exceeded \$55,000,000. Firm orders for project equipment have been placed in an additional amount of \$12,000,000, making a total expenditure and commitment to date of over \$67,000,000.

Every kilowatt—and there will be 360,000 kilowatts initially at Brownlee—is needed on schedule, to meet the foreseeable requirements of an expanding economy here in the Snake River Valley, where more and more people are being attracted by the opportunities for good living and good livelihoods.
