

## National Officer To Meet Jan. 23 With Onion Men

Jack Rose, secretary of National Onion association, will meet with onion growers and handlers of Oregon and Idaho Jan. 23, according to Clarence Lee, president of the Malheur Onion Growers association.

Rose makes headquarters at East Lansing, Mich., and is meeting with onion growers on a tour of the western states that will include the national convention of United Fresh Fruit and Vegetable growers in San Francisco Jan. 28.

He will review the market outlook for onions from figures assembled by the national association and will discuss latest developments in the industry campaign to get legislation to prohibit futures trading in onions. The national group has taken a leading stand in opposition to onion futures trading and Rose has been in contact with legislators since the start of the present session of congress.

Meeting of local people with Rose has been arranged as a no-host dinner at the East Side cafe in Ontario Thursday, Jan. 23, at 7:30 p.m. All onion growers and handlers are invited, Lee says, and stresses the fact that Idaho onion people are expected to attend as well as those in Malheur county.

## Meeting Series Set in County For Brucellosis

Representatives of the state Department of Agriculture and the United States Department of Agriculture will be in Malheur county next week for a series of meetings covering the brucellosis eradication program, according to George Bain, county extension agent.

Dr. K. J. Peterson, state veterinarian, and Dr. A. G. Beagle, veterinarian in charge of the disease eradication branch of the USDA, will be at meetings in Vale, Harper, Jordan Valley and McDermitt to discuss the requirements and mechanics of the program. It will be a good opportunity, Bain says, for ranchers to visit with these two officials who are in charge of the program and to lay plans for the final steps necessary for Malheur county to become a modified certified brucellosis free area.

The meeting in Vale will be Wednesday, Jan. 22, starting at 8 p.m. in the Bureau of Land Management office. Thursday afternoon, Jan. 23, at the Harper Grange hall, the meeting will begin at 2 p.m. The McDermitt meeting will be held at 1:30 p.m. in the White Horse Inn Friday afternoon, Jan. 24, and that evening in Jordan Valley, starting at 8 o'clock in the school building.

### New Clubs Organized

With the holidays out of the way, club enrollments are beginning to come in again. During the last month we have received enrollments for 23 additional clubs. This makes a total of 60 4-H clubs with 664 projects for which enrollments have been received to date. Broken down into projects, there are 23 cooking clubs with 194 members, 19 clothing clubs with 170 members, 13 livestock clubs with 228 projects, three woodworking clubs with 19 members and one health club with nine members.

There are several other clubs that have gotten their material and started their projects but have not as yet sent in their enrollments. A number of health clubs are organizing in the Vale and Nyssa schools to carry their projects during the last half of the school year.

Of the 60 enrollments received to date, 15 are for entirely new clubs. Eight of these are new cooking clubs, five are clothing and two are new livestock clubs.

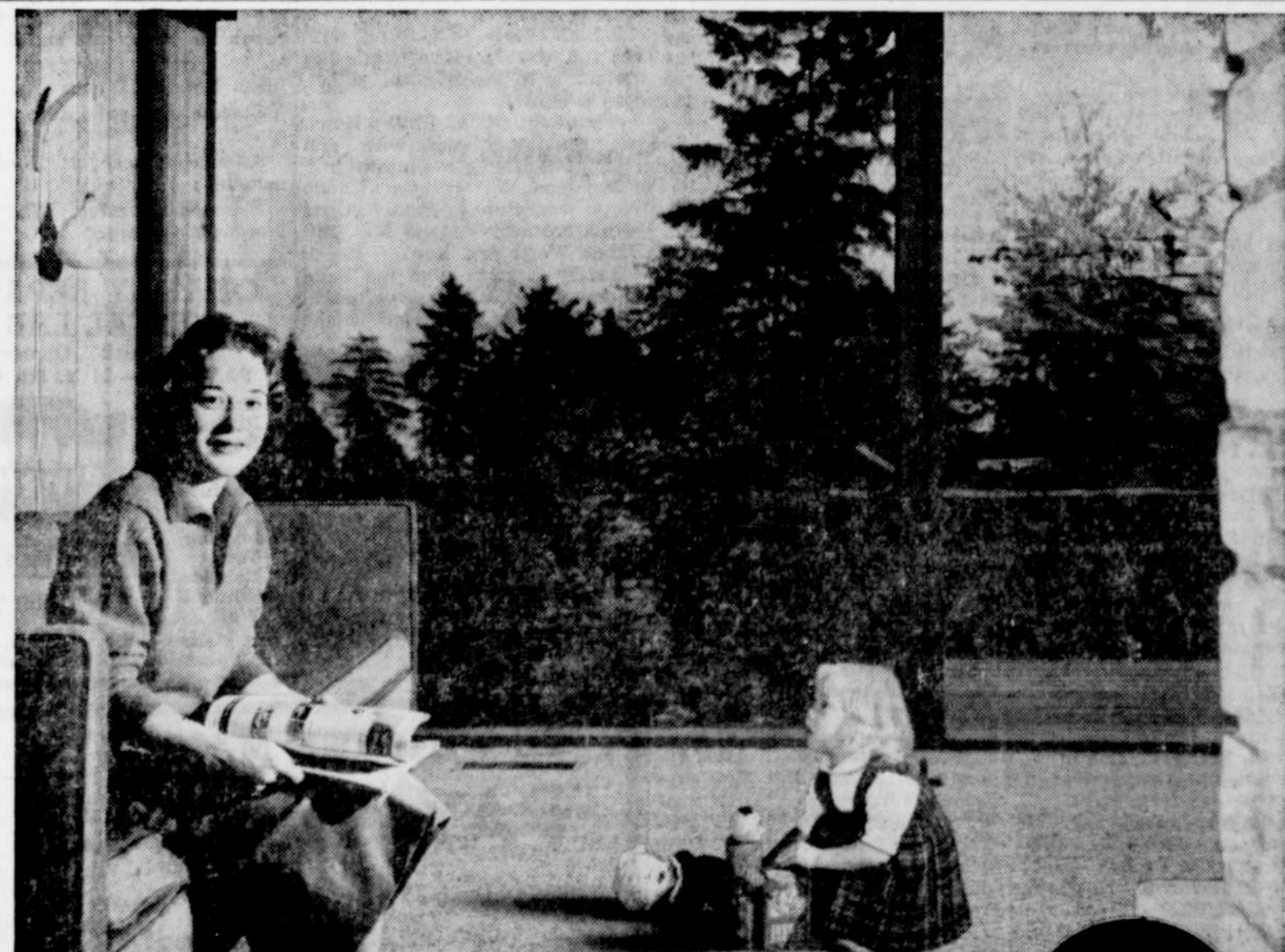
