An Indian massacre, recent impressions of Russia, hunting in the Dutch East Indies and a woman's voyage across the Atlantic alone are subjects in the books topping the list that went into circulation Saturday, Jan. 11, at the Malheur county library.

"Massacre: The Tragedy at White River" recounts the events surrounding the "Meeker Massacre" by the Ute Indians in Colorado in 1879.

"Russia Revisited" by Louis Fischer records the author's conversations with Moscow citizens and friends in 1956. He had previously lived in Russia from 1922 to 1938.

"Tigermen of Anai" by Ton Schilling relates thrilling and unique experiences in Java and Sumatra hunting tigers, crocodiles, elephants, boars, panthers, buffalo, etc.

"My Ship Is So Small" is Ann Davison's own account of her voyage alone on the sloop "Felicity Ann" from England to America, including a 65-day passage across the Atlantic from the Canary Islands to the West Indies.

"The Prodigal," a new novel by Josephine Lawrence, is a kind of morality tale about a much-married prodigal son who returns home at last to an unforeseen accounting.

"Dunbar's Cove" by Borden Deal is a story of one man's fight against TVA and the necessity for accepting change.

"April Lady" by Gergette Heyer is a romantic novel about love and the complications it brings to some persons of title in London 150 years ago.

"At Home in Mexico" by Charles Smart describes the life in San Miguel, Mexico, adopted by the author and his wife, who faced the problem of living comfortably on a small retirement income.

"Tin Can on a Shingle" by William and Ruth White dramatizes a Civil war naval battle, the famous encounter between the "Monitor" and the "Merrimack."

Charles A. Fenton edits "The Best Short Stories of World War II."

"The Winter House" by George Abbe is a novel about the son of a New England minister and his gradual maturing from an impoverished childhood through forms of protest in adolescence and college years.

"Doctor's Choice" is a collection of stories about doctors and medicine selected by doctors. The editors are Phyllis and Albert Blaustein.

"The Convert" by Margaret Cullin Banning concerns problems of understanding faced by a Protestant family, one of whose members falls in love with a Catholic girl.

"Virus in the Cell" by James Gordon Cook tells how scientists have worked against the viruses that cause such diseases as smallpox, yellow fever, influenza and polio. The book describes how viruses attack animals, plants and bacteria and explains virus research.

"Nightmare and Dawn" by Mark Aldanov revolves around the character of Schell, adventurer and espionage agent, who reaches a moment of decision in his life when he finds himself tiring of a life of intrigue at the same time that he first entertains the idea of marriage.

Concluding the list are a mystery and a western: "Three for the Chair" by Rex Stout and "The Lonely Law" by Llewellyn Holmes (writing as Matt Stuart).

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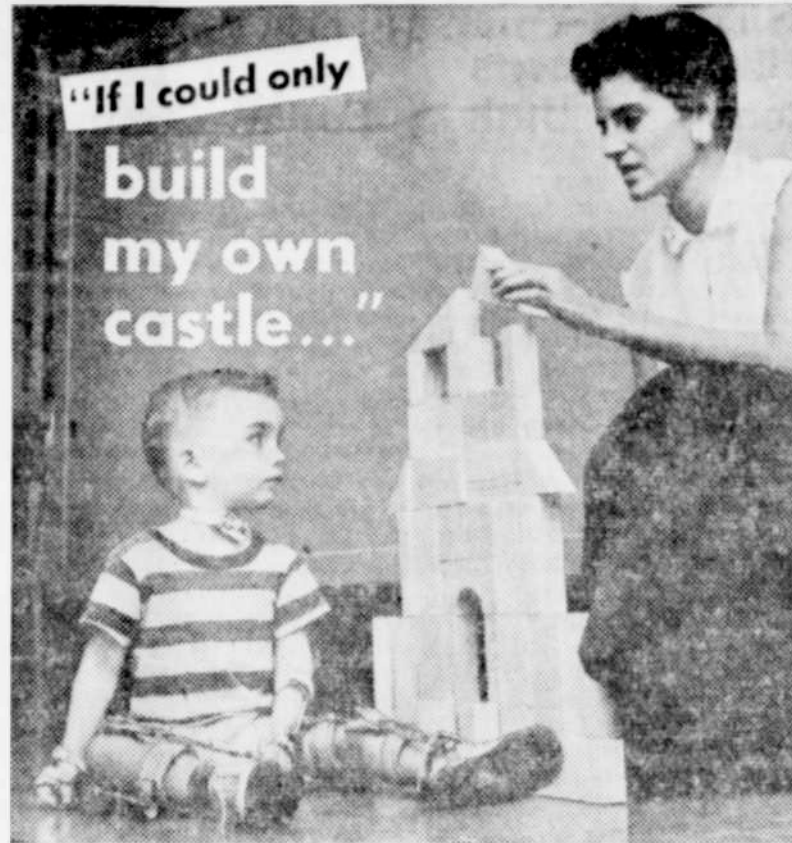
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Mailbox Approaches Should Be Cleared
