

Bulldogs Lose to Parma 54-50, To Ontario 60-37 in SRV-A Defeats; Weiser and Emmett Next on Schedule

Nyssa's basketball hopes for 1958 sunk a little lower this past week end when the Bulldogs dropped two more SRV-A league games on their home floor to give them a four lost, none won record thus far in league play.

The Bulldogs lost another game in the overtime period Friday night when a tough Parma team edged them out 54 to 50. Saturday night the exhausted Nyssa squad was trampled by Ontario 60 to 37.

In Friday night's action the Bulldogs trailed the Parma team throughout most of the game, but never by very many points. At the end of the first period Nyssa was behind 13 to 8 and at the half, 29-17.

Strong Second Half

But in the second half of play the Bulldogs came back strong as they have several times this season, picking up 15 points in the third quarter and allowing Parma only six. The third period ended with Nyssa behind only 35 to 32.

Bulldog Chuck Reib hit a free throw with only 10 seconds left in the game to tie the score at 46 all and the contest went into overtime.

Parma came back quick and strong in the extra minutes of play and led the scoring column 54 to 50 when play ended.

Beaten by Free Throws

Statistically, the Bulldogs were beaten again Friday night on the free throw line. The Parma squad hit half of their attempted free throws when they found 14 out of 28, but the Nyssa team managed to hit only 12 from 30 attempted charity shots. Field - goal - wise,

Bulldog statistics thus far in the basketball season show Gale Coleman leading the scoring column in the 11 games played with 102 points. Larry Roberts follows with a total of 80 points. Coleman has hit 39 of 131 attempted field goals and Roberts has a .400 average, hitting 28 from 70 tries. Dave Seewright has the best average but the fewest attempts. He has hit four from only six attempts.

Jim Bergam leads the rebounding department with 81 offensive and defensive rebounds to his credit. Coleman has 57 and Roberts 54 for the 11 games played this year.

The Bulldogs managed 19 from 61 tries and the Parma team 20 from 65 attempts.

High point man for the game was Parma's John Ashby with 18 points for the game. Three Bulldogs followed him. Larry Roberts hit for 13, 12 of them in the second half. Jim Bergam and Gale Coleman both had 11 points, with 16 of their total scoring in the second half.

Adrian Takes Two League Victories For Four Wins, One Loss Record

Adrian's strong Antelope basketball squad marked up more SRV-B league victories over the week end, defeating Marsing on the Adrian floor 58 to 42 Friday night and traveling to Homedale to beat them 49 to 38 Saturday night.

There was little question of the outcome Friday as the Antelopes led the visitors 16-10 at the end of the first quarter. As the half ended Adrian had doubled Marsing's tally 34-17 and by the end of the third period of play the Antelopes were still ahead 43-23.

Three Antelopes, Steve Sayre, Jim Thompson and Phil Hatch, led the scoring column with 16 points each. Marsing's high point man was R. Dines with 13.

.330 Field Goal Average

The Antelopes hit 25 of 63 attempted field goals for a .390 average and Marsing had only 32 percent in this department when they completed 17 of 52 attempts. Adrian's eye was even better at the free throw line where they hit 42 percent, completing nine of 19 tries. Marsing, too, did well with the charity tosses, completing eight from 20 for a .400.

Saturday night the Antelopes had a little more difficulty but still came out on top. They trailed Homedale 6-10 after the first quarter and were still behind 17-19 at the half. Adrian closed the gap and edged ahead in the third period 30-29 and then piled in the baskets to wind it up 49 to 38.

Shooting Improves

The Antelopes had to sharpen their shooting just a little from the night before to down Homedale. They hit 18 of 45 attempted field goals for a .400 and 13 of 24 tries at the free throw line for an excellent 54 percent. Homedale averaged only a 31 percent on all their shooting, hitting 15 of 48 attempted field goals and five from 16 free throw attempts.

High scorers in the game included Sayre with 17 points, Hatch and Kay Cleaverly with 12 each and Homedale's Parker with 15 points.
