#### Subversive Talk . . . ?

Press releases from Gov. Robert D. Holmes' office have been coming so thick and fast during his one year as governor of Oregon that we haven't been able to analyze each release, although all of them have been read. His staff must be about as confused as we are and might well check with the governor before releasing conflicting statements within short periods of time.

The first issue of "Grow With Oregon," official publication of the planning and development department, two weeks ago carried this direct statement by Gov. Holmes:

"Our development tour of Oregon was designed as a sounding board and as an education for all of us in this field and it served its purpose well. We became convinced, and the state apparently became convinced with us, that the talk of gloom and doom was subversive talk without basis in fact. Oregonians declined to be subverted by the pessimists and I think this is the greatest hope for the new year."

Last week this press release was received among several pages distributed in three mailings:

"Governor Robert D. Holmes today appealed directly to Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell to have Portland declared an economic disaster area, and to see that the community be given top priority as government contracts are let. . . . January first, Portland insured unemployed according to latest figures is 8.1. For entire state, percentage is 13.5. These against national average of 4.7. . . ."

The gubernatorial office is at least being consistent in its inconsistency.

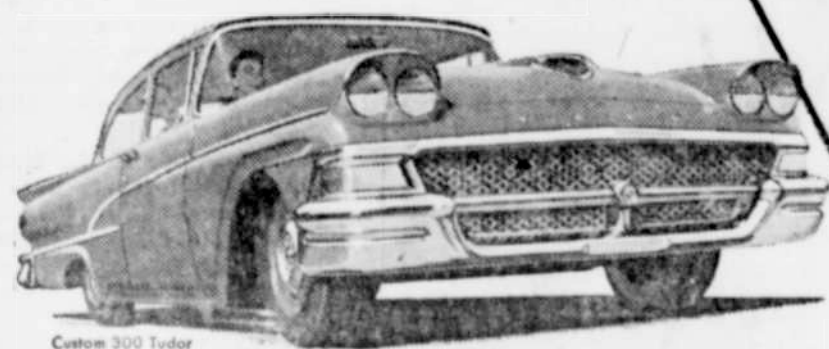
