4-H CLUB ACTIVITIES

Officer Training Slated

Officers of 4-H clubs will receive special training in the responsibilities of their respective offices at a county-wide meeting in Ontario Saturday, Feb. 1. The meeting will be in the south wing of the Ontario high school, starting at 1:30 p.m.

A general session will start the program, with some discussion on the importance of parliamentary procedure and the part it can play in good club meetings. The group will then divide into separate sessions for the various officers, presidents and vice presidents meeting in one group, secretaries in another, recreation chairmen in a third and so on.

Each of the groups will be serviced by some member of the county extension staff, who will explain some of the important phases of each job. Club members will have an opportunity to put into practice some of the features shown. The group will meet in general assembly at the end of session for a model meeting put on by members of the junior leaders organization.

In addition to the club officers, all 4-H members and leaders, as well as parents, are welcome to attend. The sessions should be helpful to anyone who takes an active part in community and county affairs.

To Attend Leaders Conference

Two leaders from Malheur county are scheduled for the annual 4-H leaders conference at Corvallis this week. Mrs. Clifford Nielsen, president of the Malheur 4-H leaders council, and Mrs. Ruby Nielsen of Ontario are slated to represent Malheur county at this yearly get-together of 4-H leaders from all over the state. Rebecca Johnston and E. M. Hauser are also scheduled to participate in this conference.

The program will feature discussion groups on understanding club numbers and a tour of the food technology facilities Thursday, project discussion and meeting of the state local leaders association Friday and a banquet featuring the International Farm Youth Exchange program Thursday evening. One session Friday will also be devoted to the junior leader project, with older club members from over the state leading the discussion.

Other district meetings are being arranged and will be announced later.

Income from 1957 Christmas Seals Far Short of Goal

A total of only \$4,906 from 1,996 contributors throughout the county has been received to date in the 1957 Christmas Seal sale of the Malheur County Tuberculosis and Health association. According to Merry Johnson, executive secretary of the association, this is not enough to successfully carry on the yearly operations of the group.

Last year nine new active cases of tuberculosis were reported in Malheur county. There currently are 30 people in the county who are suffering from TB.

Mrs. Johnson said that in the holiday rush many recipients of the seals undoubtedly overlooked association. However, she pointed out, there is still time for them to contribute and their contributions are urgently needed.
