

Nyssa Bulldogs Beat Payette 54-50, Lose to Meridian 47-41, Now Meet Vale and Parma in Week End Contests

Nyssa's Bulldogs dropped a close game on their home floor to Meridian's Warriors Friday night, 47-41, but traveled to Payette Saturday night and turned the tables, 54-50, with a man-to-man defense.

Friday night found both the Bulldogs and the Warriors strong on defense with most of the field goals being scored in the first half. Although Nyssa trailed 11-15 at the end of the first quarter, they had tied it up at 23 all by the time the half ended.

After a see-saw third quarter, the Bulldogs led 34-32, but they saw their narrow lead slip away in the last eight minutes of play as the Warriors, taking advantage of Nyssa fouls, racked up nine points on free throws to put Meridian firmly ahead 47-41.

Second Half Shooting Off

In the second half of play the Bulldogs hit only seven percent of their attempted field goals, scoring 14 of their 18 points on free throws. The Warriors scored 12 of their total of only 15 free throws in the second half but they had six field goals along with them.

Nyssa hit only 11 of 54 attempted field goals in the game but completed 17 of 29 tries at the charity line. Meridian hit 16 from 64 field shots and 15 of 29 attempted free throws.

The Warriors' Bill Young led the evening's scoring with 18 points, followed closely by Nyssa's Jim Bergam with 16.

Poor Beginning

Saturday night in Payette the Bulldogs started weak and were behind 17-6 by the end of the first quarter. Early in the second

Antelopes Down Fruitland 45-39, Beat Wilder in Closing Seconds

Adrian's Antelopes, in second place in SRV-B play, added two more victories to their credit Friday and Saturday when they downed Fruitland 45-39 and squeezed by Wilder 54-52.

Friday night at Fruitland the Antelopes started off strong and led the scoring all the way through the game, 10-7 at the first quarter, 26-17 at the half, 37-31 after three periods and 45-39 when the game ended.

Adrian hit a high 54 percent of their field goals, 18 from only 33, and just half of their 18 attempted free throws. Fruitland found only 16 of the 49 field goals they tried but hit 7 of their 15 free shots.

Cleverly High Scorer

The Antelopes' Kay Cleverly led the evening's scoring with 13 points, followed by Steve Sayre with 12 and Fruitland's Sager with 11. Adrian's Rex Langley and Jim McKinley each had 7 and Jim Thompson marked up 6.

Saturday evening at Adrian the Antelopes' shooting average dropped and they had more difficulty in topping a determined Wilder team. Wilder led at the end of the first quarter 16-15, but Adrian came back to end the half 33-26.

The Antelopes had to fight to retain their lead of 41-38 after three periods of play, and it took two free throws by Langley in the final 15 seconds of play to put them on top 54-52 as the game ended.

Hit 65% of Free Throws

Adrian hit 16 of 53 attempted

field goals in the game; Wilder found 21 of 66. At the free throw line the Antelopes hit 22 from 34 attempts—a 65 percent average. Wilder managed to make 24 chances.

Wilder's Gooding led the scoring with 22 points and their Carlson was a close second with 19. The Antelopes' Cleverly totaled up 18, Thompson 15, McKinney 9, Sayre 8 and Langley and Mike Sillonis each 2.

This week end the Antelopes meet Middleton in Adrian Friday evening and travel to Marsing for Saturday's action.

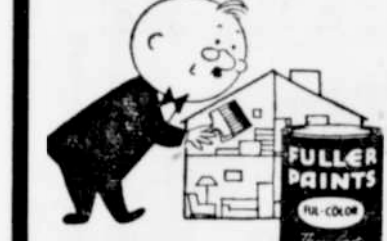
