Non-Fiction

"Monologues for Teens" by Vernon Howard.

"On Nuclear Energy" by Donald H. Hughes. This book discusses the potential of nuclear energy for peace time use. In a field where there are constant changes and developments, it provides the latest, up-to-date information. Since it is written by a leading scientist at Brookhaven National Laboratory, it is thoroughly authentic.

"Where Did You Go?" "Out." "What Did You Do?" "Nothing" by Robert Paul Smith. We double dare you to start reading this book. Inside of minutes you'll begin reading it aloud.

"The Age of Psychology" by Ernest Havemann. The writer's twin interests in writing and psychology were happily reunited when he was asked to write a series on "Psychology of Life." These articles were published in the magazine early in 1957 and in revised and expanded form they are the basis for the present book.

"The Story of Walt Disney" by Diane Disney Miller and Pete Martin. When Walt Disney arrived in Hollywood in 1923 with a \$40 grubstake in his pocket, his mind was made up to one thing only: he would not take a job in the only branch of motion pictures he knew, the animated cartoon field.

"To Live Again" by Catherine Marshall. Here is a testament of one woman's deep belief in God and His love—and all that she was able to accomplish as a result of this belief.

Fiction

"The Sound of Thunder" by Taylor Caldwell. The author spans the years 1904-37 to tell the history of an American family which settled its roots in a town in upper New York state and then brought forth its good and bad fruit. The years were enough for a small food store to become a food store chain and for the strengths of Maria Enger and the weaknesses of Heinrich Enger to shape the lives of their five children.

"Captain Rebel" by Frank Yerby. A rebel against the United States as he runs guns and supplies for the Confederacy. But Captain Meredith is also a rebel to the depths of his soul. He has no use for the church in which his brother, Joe, is a preacher, yet in time of crisis, he proves to be a truly religious man. He defies the rules of his society when he makes a strange pact with the Quadroon beauty, Laurie.

"The Healer" by Frank G. Slaughter. Mr. Donald Carter was tormented with self-doubt. Had he been careless with a human life? Only one person—Laura Jordan, his operating room nurse—could tell him. When she lost her memory in an accident, he faced the most difficult decision of his career.

Library Offers Interesting List Of New Volumes

Biography, hunting and Arctic exploration are the subjects of books heading the list of those going into circulation Saturday, Feb. 8, at the Malheur county library.

A famous western gunfighter and marshal is the subject of a biography by Richard O'Connor, "Bat Masterson."

Another biography concerns a hero of the Civil war, "Jeb Stuart, The Last Cavalier" by Burke Davis.

Three of Jim Corbett's popular books on big-game hunting particularly his hunts for man-eating tigers, are combined in an unabridged edition, "Man-Eaters of India."

"Quest for a Continent" by Walter Sullivan is a history of Arctic expeditions and of the exploits of men who have risked their lives to conquer this strange world of 80-below temperatures and of a size greater than all Europe.

"Riders of Judgment" by Frederick Manfred is set in the Wyoming territory during the John-

son county range wars and is the story of Cain Hammett who desires peace but is forced to fight when the cattle barons invade his territory. "The Mask" is a novel of South Africa in the 1850's by Stuart Cloete.

"Weep No More" by Janet Stevenson is a suspense story of the Civil war, about the activities of a woman spy for the Union in Richmond.

"Mrs. Daffodil" by Gladys Taber is a novel about a woman writer of a syndicated newspaper column and her life on her Connecticut farm where a legion of fans descend on her at all hours.

"A Use of Riches" by John Stewart tells of the dilemma of a happily married couple when they discover that the lady's first husband, whom they believed to be dead, is alive.

"Woman with Arthritis" is the true story by a woman writing as Ann Scott, of her experiences in the development of arthritis and her recovery from it through psychotherapy.

"Desegregation and the Law" by Albert Blaustein and Clarence Ferguson discusses the meaning and effect of the school segregation cases.

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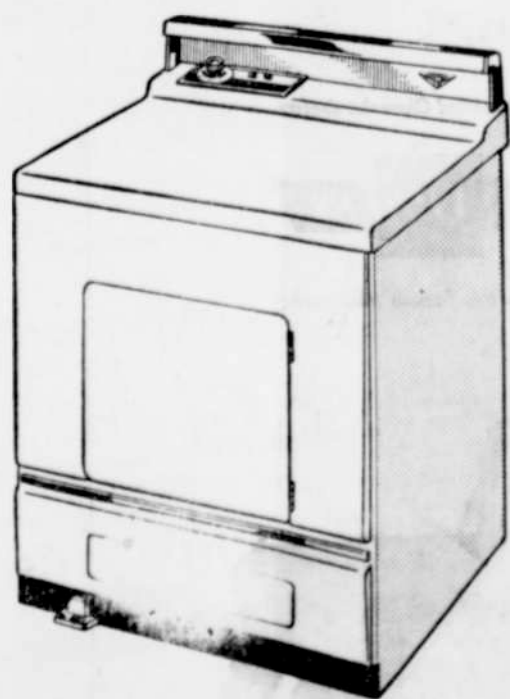
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
