Citizens' Committee Recommends Meters

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of water revenues within four years, without additional cost to water users. They recommended that the metering program be initiated in the city's 1958-59 budget year, if possible, and that priority be given to its early completion.

Sewer Rates Given
On sewer rates, the committee recommended a minimum charge of \$1.25 per month for all water users within the city having access to the sanitary sewer system and, for all cases in which more than one water user is served by a single water service line \$1.25 for the first unit, 75 cents for the second unit and 25 cents for each additional unit.

The committee suggested that the sewer volume rate be 30 percent of the amount of the monthly water charge.

The citizens' group recommended that until water meters are installed a sewer charge of \$1.25 per month for residential units be adopted.

Other Recommendations
Other committee recommendations included in their report suggested that monthly minimum water charges be halved in the event of water service discontinuation; that water and sewer minimum rates be doubled in all cases of service to properties located outside the corporate limits of the city; and that charges to water users not served by a metered service line should be made on the basis of the flat rate water schedule now in effect in Nyssa.

The citizens' committee was appointed by Mayor Main in July, 1957, to undertake a comprehensive study of municipal water and sewer rates in the city and to ascertain any need for revision of existing rates and submit recommendations to the city council.

Results from Protests
Owners and operators of multiple dwelling units had protested inequities in the city's charges for both sewer and water to the council.

The committee concluded, after months of study, that water and sewer rate structures "which will fulfill the requirements of adequate revenue production, fairness of allocation and elimination of waste water are possible only if water is distributed through meters."

The committee's recommendations have been sent to each city council member and will be formally presented to the council at either its February or March meeting.
