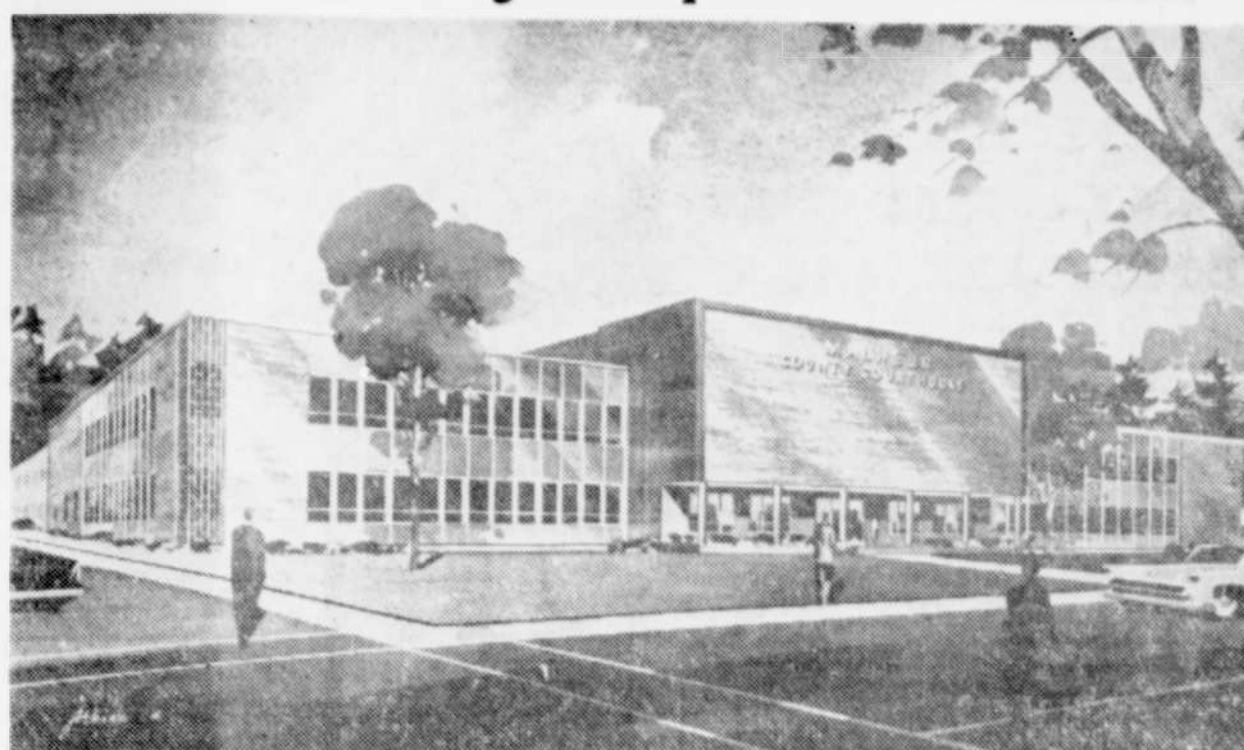

AN ARCHITECT'S drawing of Malheur county's proposed new \$504,000 courthouse (including furnishings) which hangs on the decision of county voters at the May primary election. The building calls for steel reinforced concrete with brick facing and panel window walls

and is described as fireproof, floodproof and earthquake proof. The county has \$264,000 in its courthouse sinking fund and the remainder would be raised from a bond issue on which voters will pass judgment. Also on the ballot will be a question, "Shall a new courthouse be constructed on the site of the present courthouse in Vale?"

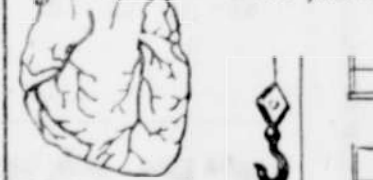

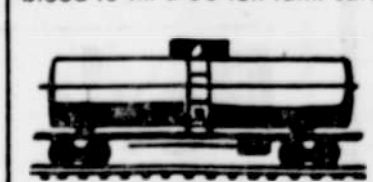

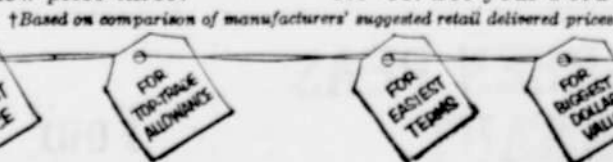
