## Bulldogs Drop Two More Games In Week End Action as Ontario Wins 69-50, Weiser Rallies 69-63

Nyssa's Bulldogs dropped two more basketball games last week end, being well-trounced by Ontario 69-50 Friday night and losing out to Weiser in the final quarter 69-63 Saturday.

Friday evening in Ontario, Nyssa was ahead briefly in the first quarter 5-4 and managed to hold the Tigers' lead to a narrow 12-10 margin at the end of the first quarter. However, league-leading Ontario let loose in the second period and had widened the margin to 32-20 by the time the half-time buzzer sounded.

The Bulldogs managed only 10 points in the third quarter, as they had in both of the first two. The Tigers racked up 19, however, as the period ended 51-30. Even though Nyssa outscored them by two points in the final period of play, it wasn't enough and Ontario led 69-50 as the game ended.

**Not Enough Shots**  
Percentage-wise the Bulldogs were ahead of the Tigers, but they failed getting near as many shots. Nyssa had nearly a 271 field goal average, hitting 14 from 51 attempts. On free throws the Bulldogs really did well, completing 22 from 28 chances.

Scoring for the evening found four of the Tigers with 10 or more points—Jerry Evans 14, Tony Keller 13, David Capps 11 and Doug Sargent 10. Larry Roberts led Bulldog scoring with 11, followed by Jim Bergam with 8 and Gary Toomb, Gale Coleman and Burton Smith with 6 each.

**Shooting Eyes Improve**  
In Saturday night's action on their home floor, the Bulldogs' accuracy from the field improved and so did their chances of winning, but largely because of their work on the backboards, Weiser edged Nyssa out in the final half of the last quarter.

Although Weiser's Wolverines went ahead with a free throw in the first 10 seconds of play, the Bulldogs took the lead within the first minute and led 21-15 at the end of the first quarter. In the last six minutes of the first half the Wolverines went to work on Nyssa's 26-17 lead and left the floor at half-time only one point behind, 36-35.

**Nyssa Leads Again**  
Nyssa edged ahead again for the first half of the third period and then the score saw-sawed back

and forth until the period ended 51-51 as the Wolverines' Jay Doyle tied it up in the last minute.

The Bulldogs came back strong again in the final quarter of play but once more slipped behind after about three minutes. They were never quite able to overtake the determined Wolverines.

**Rebounds, Free Throws Hurt**  
A combination of rebounds (41 for Weiser, only 34 for Nyssa) and free throws (Weiser 23 for 17, Nyssa only 17 tries for 9) are what

actually defeated the fighting Bulldogs. They completed 26 of their 65 attempted field goals while Weiser managed only 26 of their 76 attempts. What's more, Nyssa completed 51 percent of their field goals in the first half.

Weiser's 6-ft. Roger Gallagher was high point man for the evening with 20 points. Bergam followed closely with 18 for the Bulldogs and the Wolverines' Jay Doyle trailed him by only one point with 17.

**Weiser's First Win**  
Both Coleman and Roberts racked up 16 Bulldog points. Jerry Myrick had 7, Gary Toomb 4 and Smith 2.

Saturday's win was Weiser's first this season in conference play and even with it they still remain a little farther in the league basement than the Bulldogs.

This week end Nyssa faces only a one-game schedule when they meet a tough Emmett team here Saturday night.

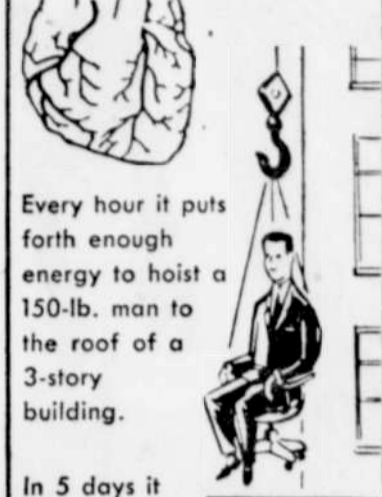

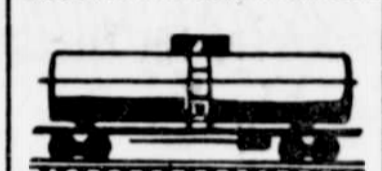

## Antelopes Drop SRV-B Lead Chance With 64-61 Loss to Notus, Hold Second Place with Homedale Win

Adrian's Antelopes missed tying for first place in the SRV-B basketball league by just three points Saturday night as a determined Notus squad beat down a last minutes' rally 64-61 after the Antelopes had coasted by Homedale 54-41 the night before.

As in Nyssa the week end before, the spectators' action following the Saturday contest in Adrian approximated the fast action of the teams during the game. There was even an injury or two reported among the fans as a result of the after-the-game activity. However, as in Nyssa the preceding week, the score remained unchanged.

Adrian trailed league-leading Notus up until the closing minute of the game. As the quarter ended they were behind 9-17, at the end of the half 29-34 and by the finish of three quarters of play 38-49.

### Tied in Final Minute

In a strong fourth period rally the Antelopes managed to tie up the game with less than a minute left to play. Notus then bounced one point ahead again on a free throw.

After Notus' gift shot the Antelopes took the ball down court but the fighting league-leaders tied it up with about four seconds left and the official's whistle blew for a jump ball. Just after the whistle, Adrian shot and made a basket that could have put them ahead but the officials ruled it didn't count because of the whistle. Instead they had to jump the ball and Notus took the tip-off, tore down the court and made the final score 64-61.

### Shooting Accurate

Adrian did an excellent job of hitting the basket, but they didn't try enough to put them ahead. The Antelopes sank 11 of their 12 free throws and 25 of their 32 attempted field goals swished through the net.

Adrian's Steve Sayre was high point man for the evening with 22 to his credit. Next came Notus' Merritt with 21 and Kruger with 18. Other Adrian scoring found Phil Hatch with 17, Kay Cleverly 13, Rex Langley 4, Leon

ard Woods 3 and Jim Thompson with 2.

### Charge by Homedale

Also in Adrian Friday night, the Antelopes had little difficulty in downing Homedale 54-41. They edged ahead of the visitors 12-9 by the end of the first quarter and tripled this margin 27-18 by the close of the half. The Antelopes had surged ahead 45-28 after three periods of play and they beat down a Homedale rally, almost before it began, to have the score stand at 54-41 as the final buzzer sounded.

The Antelopes hit 43 percent of their field goals, completing 18 from 41 attempts and 69 percent of their charity shots, hitting 18 from 26 tries. Homedale managed the same field goal average, with 19 of their 42 attempts finding their mark. However, the visitors had only 6 tries from the free throw line, even though they made half of them.

Sayre was high man Friday night with 17. Hatch followed with 14, J. Thompson 9, Cleverly 7, Woods and Mike Sillonis each 2 and Langley and Don Thompson 1 each.

The week end action set the Antelopes firmly in second place in the SRV-B league while Notus undisputedly holds first.

The Antelopes were slated to play Harper last night (Wednesday) in a non-league game. They travel to New Plymouth for their last league game of the season Saturday night.
