(Continued from Page 1) he worked for the Idaho Power company. During this summer he also sent out about 20 applications for a teaching position and late in the fall he was hired to teach the sixth, seventh and eighth grades in the Wilder elementary school.

After a year at Wilder, Sayre was offered a better position at the Notus high school and he went there as baseball, basketball and football coach in 1938.

June 14, 1939, our Man About married Caroline Henderson, an Owyhee county girl he had met at college.

In the fall of the same year he accepted an offer to again coach all three sports and to teach social studies at Parma high school. During the Sayres' two years at Parma, their first son, Steven, was born in 1940.

In 1941 Sayre was offered, and accepted, the position of principal of the Wilder high school. During this year at Wilder, he also coached the baseball team which won the district 3 championship.

Superintendent at Marsing

The following year he was hired as superintendent of Marsing's public schools, both grade and high school. During his three years at Marsing, our Man About also coached all high school sports because of the difficulty of hiring coaches during the war. Once again his teams were winners, taking two district championships.

In October of 1942 the Sayres' second son, Fred, was born.

A short hitch in the Army interrupted Sayre's duties at Marsing in 1945, but he returned to that area in 1946 and worked on a newspaper, the Owyhee Nugget, until a new school year started.

In the fall of 1946 he began a five-year term as superintendent of schools in Parma. In 1950 Sayre received his master's degree from the university and his third son, Lewis, was born.

Enjoys Adrian Position

Sayre came to Adrian in 1951 as principal of the Union high school, a position he describes as one of the most attractive and challenging that he has held. While he has been at Adrian the high school has been admitted to the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools, a recognized accrediting agency.

Also since arriving in Adrian the Sayres' daughter, Leah, was born in 1954 and their fourth son, Casey, arrived in 1955.

Sayre's two eldest boys are already beginning to follow somewhat in their father's footsteps. Steve, an Adrian high school senior, is one of the high scorers on

Nearly 100 Attend Hearing on Street Improvement Plan

(Continued from Page 1) out losing quality and that he actually "wants the street improvement program even though the cost is high."

Also, City Manager A. R. (Jack) Middaugh reported late yesterday that one property owner who earlier made a protest to the improvement had come into the city offices and requested that his objections be withdrawn.

The city has already incurred \$6,640 in engineering costs, plus city and council administration costs, for the previously approved improvements. These costs must now be paid as a general obligation by all of Nyssa's city taxpayers.

Tuesday night's assessment roll hearing convened in the city council chambers as scheduled but, because of the size of the crowd, moved to the Little theatre in Nyssa's high school.

Improvement Program Explained
At the meeting, Mayor Main and City Attorney Henigson explained the steps that had been taken thus far in establishing the street improvement district and that an assessment roll hearing was designed to hear protests regarding errors in individual assessments or protests of the method of assessment.

The remonstrance hearing for objections to areas to be included in the improvement district was held Nov. 15 after the council had received petitions requesting the improvements, considered preliminary engineering reports and recommendations and proposed the outlines of the district.

The council unanimously passed the ordinance establishing such a district on Nov. 26 and city voters approved the issuance of \$48,000 in general obligation bonds to pay the city's share of the construction on Dec. 16 at a special election.

Assessment Method Explained
City Manager Middaugh explained the method that had been used in making assessments for the improvement of "side" streets and Earl Reynolds of the city's engineering firm explained the costs of various types of surfacing and the advantages of asphaltic concrete which had been selected by the council.

After all protests were heard the council met to tabulate and consider them. After deliberation until past midnight, Councilman Walker Low made a motion, seconded by Councilman Orin Sumner, to have the city attorney draft the ordinances cancelling the street improvement district. The council gave unanimous approval to the motion.

The ordinances abolishing the street improvement district will not become final until they have had three readings before the council and receive official council approval.

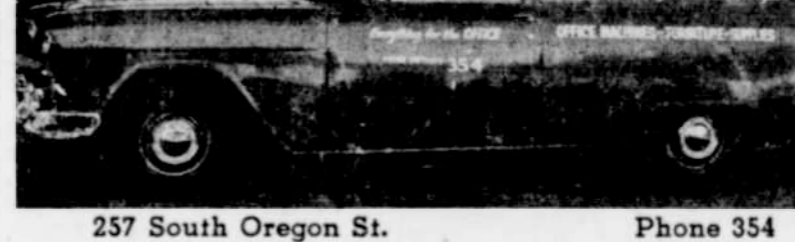
