"The White Witch" by Elizabeth Goudge is a new novel depicting England torn by the divided loyalties of civil war in the time of Charles I, told through the character of a nobleman who poses as an itinerant painter but is in reality a royalist spy.

"Custer's Fall" by David Miller presents the Indian side of the story, based on 22 years of research and acquaintance with Indians who participated in the Battle of the Little Big Horn.

"Dough, Ray and Me" by Pat Kilmer is the adventures of a couple and their two children when they leave their life in Detroit to embark upon a bakery enterprise in Cabeza, N.M., without either money or experience. The book's subtitle is "The adventures of a family who gave up social security for home on the range."

"I Married a Hunter" by Marjorie Michael is a woman's eye view of life on safari with her husband and two young daughters by the wife of a hunter turned photographer.

"The Living Legend" by Alan Phillips is the story of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

"The Woman from Sicily" by Frank Swinnerton is a story about an Englishman who leaves home on a stormy evening with a gun

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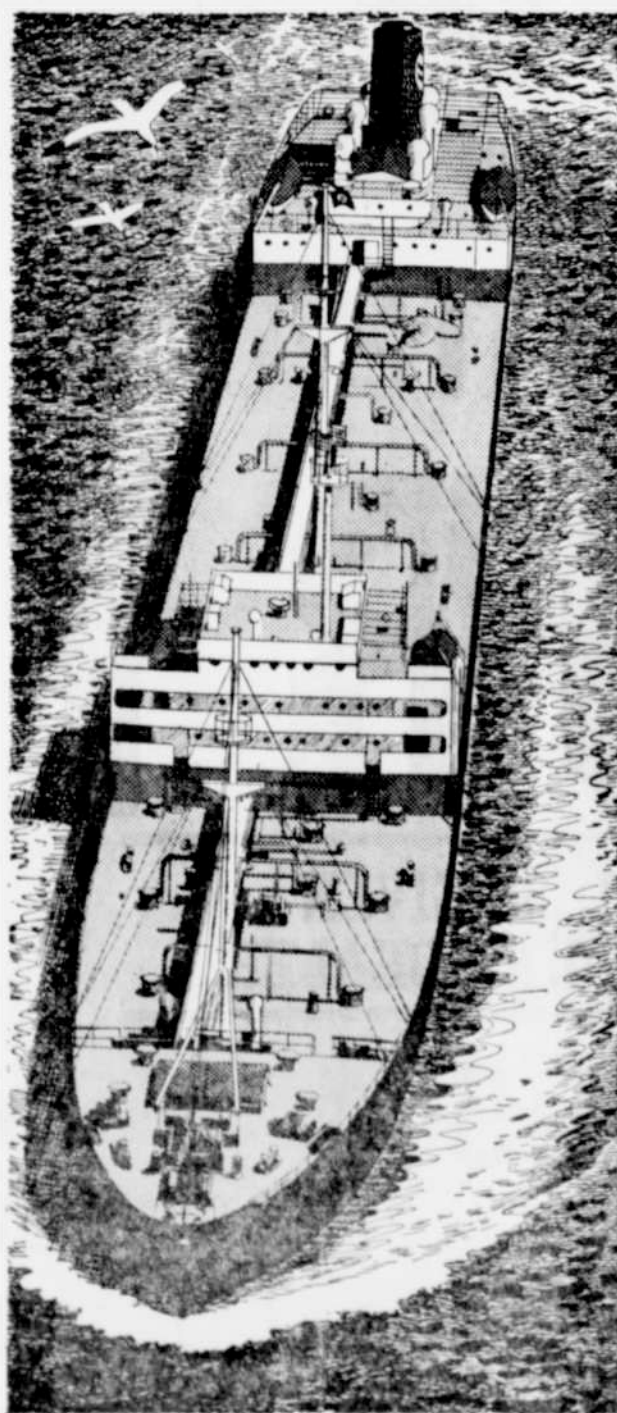
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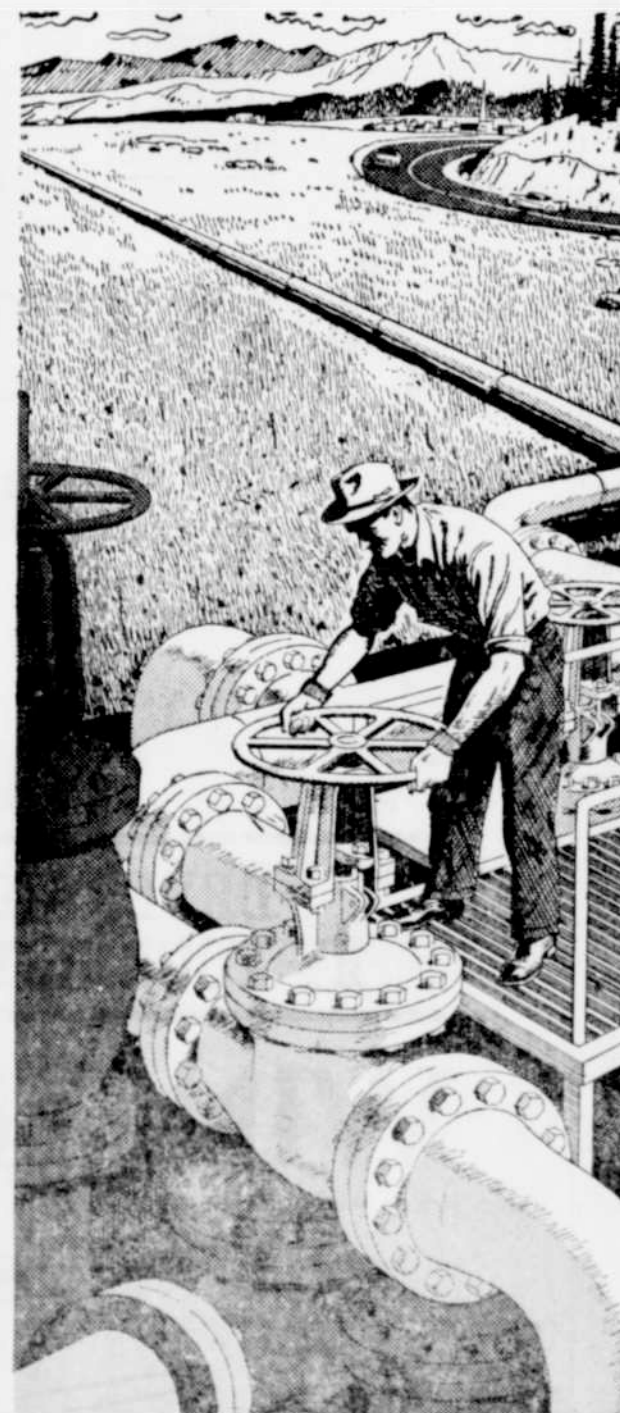
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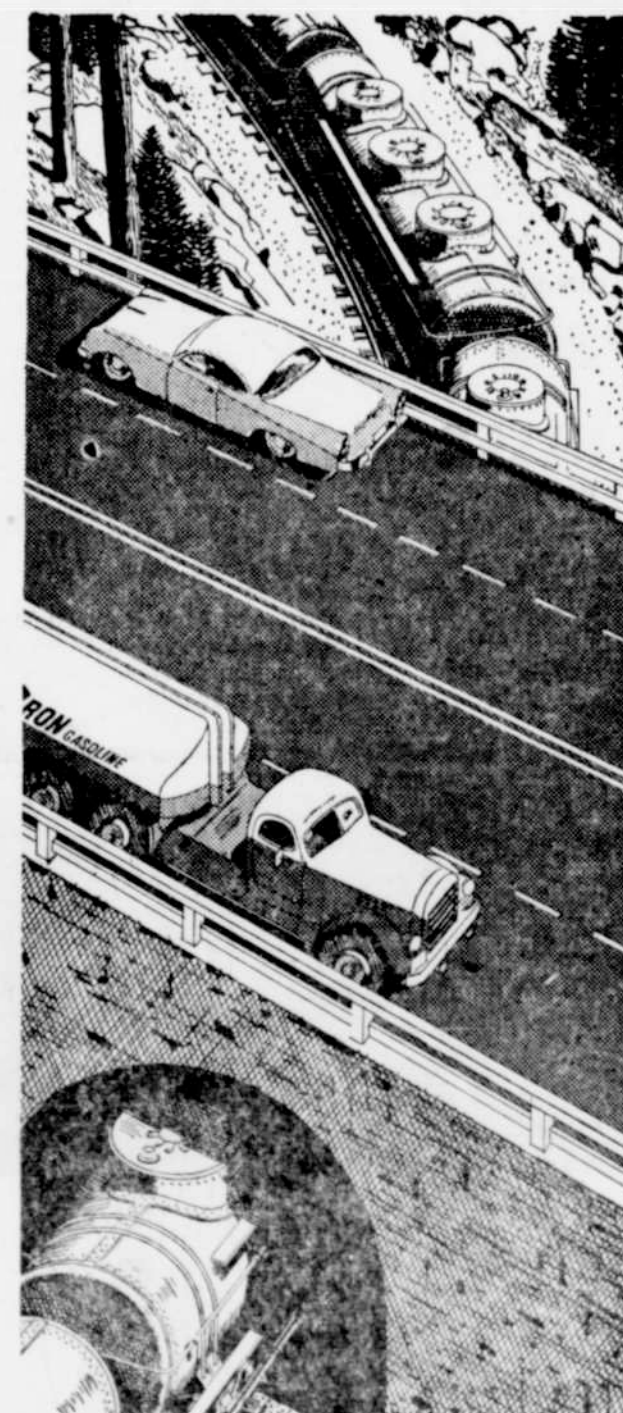
