We do well to keep in mind that in the eyes of God there can be no difference between a materialistic capitalist and an atheistic communist. Each has chosen to serve "Mammon" rather than God.

The state may from political

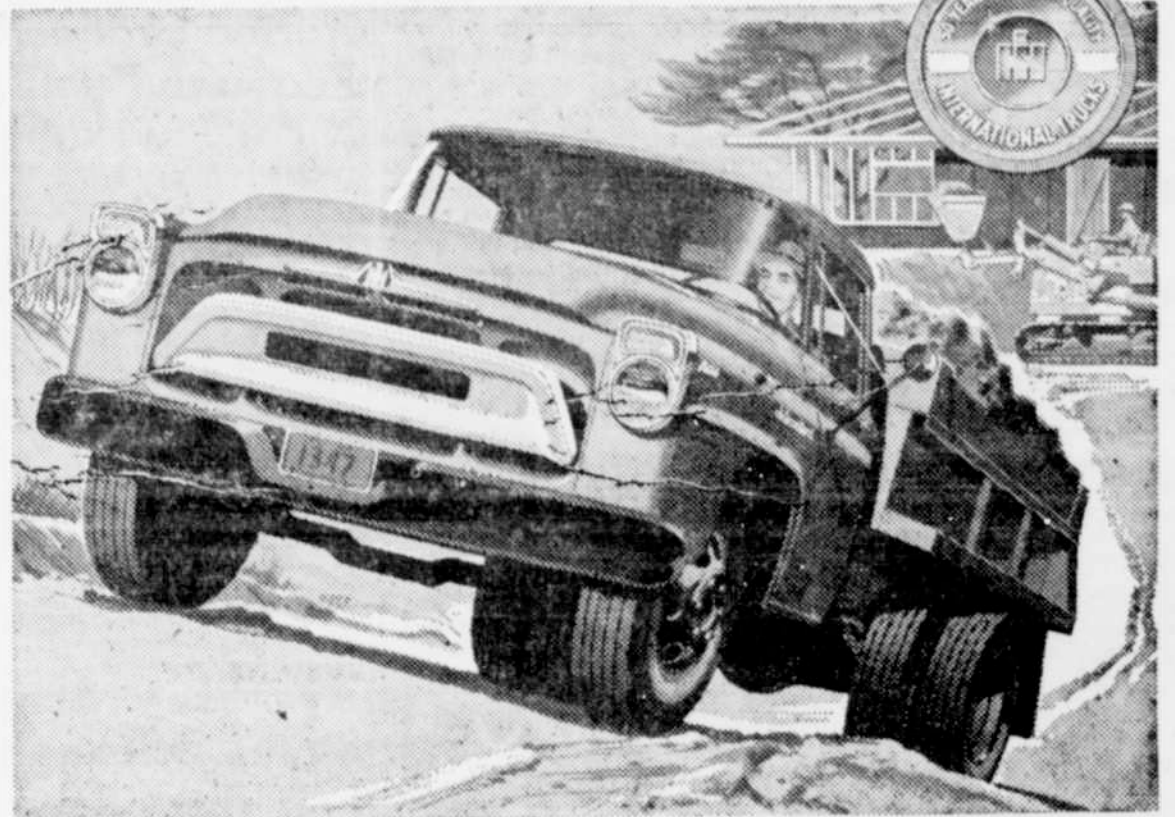
expediency or from altruistic motives make loans or give technical assistance to needy and "backward" nations, but in no sense is this to be considered an arm of the church. On the other hand the church should feed the hungry, clothe the naked and otherwise minister to physical needs, aware that this is not the chief Christian aim. If our emphasis is wholly physical we are operating in the same field as are materialists and communists.

Let the church be the church and minister to the whole person, remembering the eternal truth that man cannot live by bread alone.
