

Emmett's Huskies Tounce Bulldogs By 20 Points, 71-51; John Day Slated For Season's Last Game in Nyssa

Emmett's Huskies, one of the finest ball-handling clubs to play in Nyssa's gym this season, trounced the hapless Bulldogs 71-51 Saturday night as the year's basketball season drew to within a week of its end.

Set back on their heels right from the opening buzzer by the fast and polished ball-handling Huskies, the Bulldogs never came close.

Emmett scored in the first 30 seconds of play and had run up a 10-point lead when Larry Roberts dropped in the first Bulldog bucket after nearly half of the first period had been played. There was barely two minutes of play in the quarter when Jerry Myrick sank Nyssa's second two-pointer to make the score 4-14.

Bulldogs Trail at Quarter

As the period ended with Emmett's Ralph Donaldson hitting a basket in the last five seconds the Bulldogs trailed 9-17.

The Huskies had little difficulty keeping their lead in the second quarter as they sank free throws with deadly accuracy. The half ended, this time with Emmett's Ron Schiller sinking one in the final second, with Emmett ahead 33-21.

The Huskies had soared ahead 55-36 by the end of the third period. The last quarter saw the ball streak from one end of the court to the other, with some especially

long tosses, and Emmett stretched the lead to 20 points as the game ended with the score 71-51. The Bulldogs manager only two points in the last three minutes of play. The Huskies marked up eight.

Emmett Leads with Field Goals

Emmett hit only about 375 of their field goals, sinking 24 from 64 attempts, but the Bulldogs dropped in only 253 of theirs, attempting 71 but hitting only 18. On free throws the Bulldogs hit better than 55 per cent, marking up 15 points from 27 shots, but the Huskies sank nearly 75 percent of theirs, attempting 31 and dropping in 23 of them.

Emmett's Schiller was undisputed high man for the evening with 26 points from 10 field goals and six free throws. Nyssa's Myrick had a good evening, too, hitting six field goals and seven free throws for 19 points.

In other Bulldog scoring Jim Bergam had 11 points; Gary Toomb, 10; Gale Coleman, 5; and Jack Meyers, David Sewright and Roberts, each 2.

Saturday night's contest left the Bulldogs with only two more games this season. They wind up play on their home floor this Saturday night against John Day.

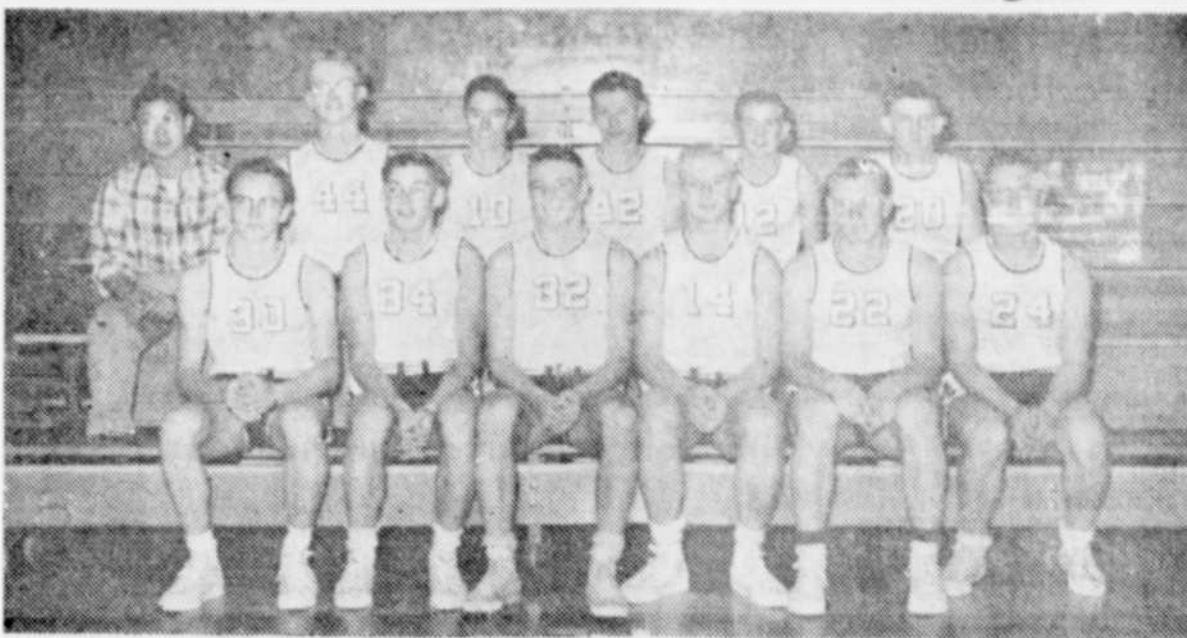

Meridian Downs Nyssa in Last SRV-A Contest

Nyssa's bulldogs dropped their last game of SRV-A league play Tuesday night, 63-52, when they traveled to Meridian. The Bulldogs wound up league action with an 11 lost, 2 won record for the season.

Nyssa fell behind 6-17 in the first quarter and was never able to close the margin. After a free-throwing first half for both teams, the Bulldogs were trailing by 10 points, 31-21.

Falling a little further behind they trailed 29-42 after three periods and, even though the Bulldogs gained a little ground in the final quarter, Meridian maintained 11 points of their lead as the game ended 63-52.

Field goals in the game were fairly evenly matched with Nyssa hitting only 15 of 57 attempts for little better than 26 percent and Meridian connecting with about 28½ percent as they hit 18 of 63.

The Bulldogs did well on the foul line, though, hitting 22 of 36 tries, and Meridian sank 27 of their gift shots. Two Nyssa players fouled out before the contest ended and three Meridian players were also sidelined. In addition, several boys on both teams had four fouls chalked against them before the wide-open affair ended.

Two Meridian players had high point honors for the evening. Bates racked up 18 points and Estrick had 17.

Nyssa scoring had Jerry Myrick, Gale Coleman and Jim Bergam each with 10 points; Daryl Duffin 7; David Sewright 6; Tom Jayo 4; LeRoy Morris and Clark Jaques, each 2; and Jack Meyers 1.

Saturday night the Bulldogs are slated to meet John Day on the Nyssa Court in their last scheduled game of the season.

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Antelopes Down Harper 51-40, Drop Last Game to New Plymouth 47-33

Adrian's Antelopes, well set in second place in SRV-B league standings, had little difficulty trouncing Harper 51-40 last Wednesday night in a non-league game, but couldn't hit the basket Saturday night as New Plymouth downed them 47-33.

In Harper the Antelopes could manage only a 9-6 lead by the end of the first quarter and had widened the margin by only one more as the half ended 19-15.

In the third quarter Adrian began to pick up a little steam and the period ended with the Antelopes leading 37-27. In the fourth quarter Harper did their most scoring, but as the final buzzer sounded they were still on the short end of the 51-40 score.

The Antelopes were a little below their high season's average on completed field goals Wednesday night as they hit only 17 of 46 attempts for 36 percent. Harper completed the same number but attempted two more for 34 percent.

Technically, the Antelopes won the game on the foul line, hitting a big 73 percent of their free throws, or 17 from 23. Harper managed only 6 from 17 charity shots.

Adrian's Kay Cleverly was high point man for the evening with 16 points, followed closely by Harper's Ron Marchek with 14.

Other Antelope scoring included Steve Sayre with 9, Phil Hatch 8, Jim Thompson 7, Mike Sillonis 4, LeRoy Bishop, Don Thompson

and Leonard Wood, 2 each, and Ron Kirstine 1.

Saturday night in New Plymouth interest in SRV-B league mouth the Antelopes, seeming to play after the preceding week's narrow defeat by Notus doomed them to second place, led only for the first quarter as it ended 10-9. In the second period New Plymouth edged ahead as halftime arrived with the scoreboard showing N.P. 19, Adrian 18.

Failing to find the basket with their field goal shots, the Antelopes trailed 22-32 by the end of three quarters of play. Although Adrian added 10 points in the final period, New Plymouth did even better and the game ended 47-33 in their favor.

Adrian's field goal average sunk to a low 25 percent as they managed to find only 12 of the 48 they shot. New Plymouth hit 19 of their 34 attempts from the field for a 55 percent average.

On free throws the Antelopes' eyes were as good as ever as they hit 10 of only 14 attempts. New Plymouth found only 9 of their 22 charity shots.
