

Variety of Topics Included in New Books at Library

Assorted titles from mountain climbing to capital punishment head the group of books going into circulation Saturday, March 1, at Malheur county library.

"Kangchenjunga, the Untrodden Peak" by Charles Evans is a book about the successful ascent of the third highest mountain in the world by the leader of the expedition which scaled it in 1955.

"Helmet for My Pillow" by Robert Leckie is an account of war in the South Pacific by a Marine private.

"The Best of the American Cowboy" is a compilation by Ramon Adams of selections from books that he thinks best narrate the life and profession of the oldtime cowboy.

"Reflections on Hanging" by Arthur Koestler is the author's condemnation of what he calls "legal homicide" that was influential in England's recent movement for the abolition of the death penalty.

"The Prisoners of Combine D" is Len Giovannitti's account in the form of a novel about life in a German POW camp, based on personal experience.

"Deep Water" by Patricia Highsmith is a novel of suspense about an apparently patient husband with a vivacious wife and an unbelievable bent toward murder.

"New Dreams for Old" by Tom Person tells the story of a girl who gives up plans for a career to run her sick father's cotton farm.

"The Southerner" is a novel by Douglas Kiker about a young man who returns from navy duty to work as a newspaper reporter in his native South and becomes involved with the state's first school segregation test case.

"Faraway" by Andre Dhotel is a prize-winning French novel, an imaginative tale about how an aunt is foiled in her determination to
