Hearings Slated For Onion Futures By Senate Group

Tom Jones, chairman of Malheur county's Democratic central committee, said he received a telegram from Senators Wayne Morse and Richard Neuberger Wednesday afternoon advising him there will be a Senate Agricultural committee hearing in Washington, D.C., on onion futures bills March 20 through 25.

The telegram advised that those favoring onion futures bill S-778 and related bills will have an opportunity to testify or submit statements March 20-21. Opponents will testify March 24 and 25. The senators said those desiring to testify before the committee should submit written statements and "notify either of us as soon as possible."

city and council administration costs, for the previously approved improvements. These costs, if the council finalizes its Feb. 11 action must now be paid as a general obligation by all of Nyssa's city taxpayers.

The engineers had completed their field survey for the improvements and were nearly done with the engineering design work for the project by Feb. 11. They also had prepared the assessment roll for the district.

Two Hearings Held
A re-announced hearing for objections to the areas included in the improvement district was held by the city council Nov. 15. Protests heard at an assessment roll hearing prompted the council's action at their last regular meeting.

The council unanimously approved the improvement of 48 blocks of streets and 11 alleys Nov. 26 and city voters approved the issuance of \$48,000 in general obligation bonds to pay the city's share of the construction on Dec. 16 at a special election.

Assessments for the project were made on the basis of \$6.80 per front foot. Side street assessments were made at the rate of
