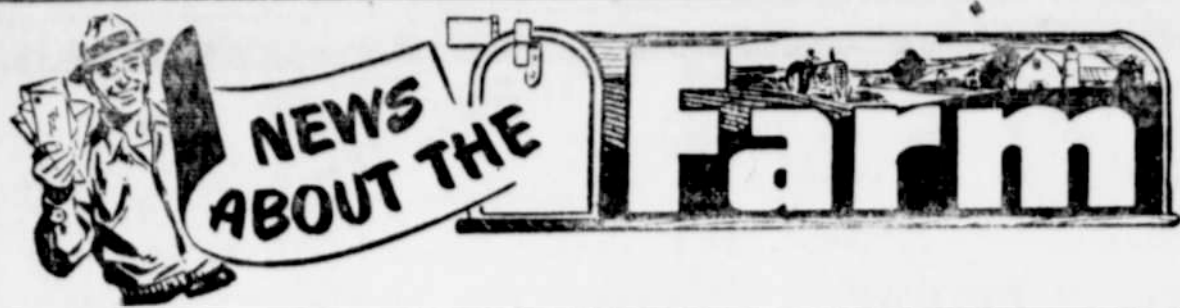




O.T. Grangers Discuss Varied Farm Subjects
