

Assorted Titles Include Novels, FBI Experiences

Assorted titles ranging from an FBI agent's experiences and a wartime pilot's escape to travel books and novels went into circulation Saturday, March 8, at Malheur county library.

"Yankee G-Man" by Frederick Ayer recounts the author's most thrilling moments as an FBI agent and intelligence officer in tracking down criminals and foreign agents at home and abroad.

"The One That Got Away" by Kendal Burt and James Leasor is a breath-taking true story of escape and pursuit concerning a Luftwaffe pilot shot down over England who vowed that no prison camp would hold him.

"Why We Behave Like Americans" by Bradford Smith takes a look at basic characteristics of contemporary America and its people.

"Parade with Banners" by Donald Peattie is made up of the author's essays on patriotic highlights of American history, many of which have appeared in the Reader's Digest.

"Doctor Courageous" by Alfred Noyes Trosas is the story of Dr. Grantly Dick Read who pioneered "natural childbirth" against great odds.

"The Square Pegs" by Irving Wallace presents the stories of "some Americans who dared to be different," 19th-century eccentrics whose lives were amazing and in some cases amusing.

"The Indian Tipi" by Reginald and Gladys Laubin is a record of the history, construction and use of this movable shelter.

"The Unquiet Germans" by Charles Thayer, a diplomat and journalist, considers various aspects of the German character, analyzes the achievements and failures of the Allied occupation and appraises Soviet endeavors in East Germany.

Two travel books are the well-illustrated "Portugal" by Yves Bottineau and "A Traveller in Rome" by Henry Morton.

"The Amulet" is a novel by Hal Borland about a confederate soldier during the Civil war who carried with him an amulet which is to him a symbol of love but to his comrades a charm with special magic.

"The Devil's Cross" by Walter O'Meara is the story of a 13th-century knight on a quest to find the daughter of a count, who had joined the ill-fated Children's Crusade.

"March the Ninth" by Ray Hutchinson is the story of a young Viennese doctor whose decisive action in performing a humane, if illicit, operation on an escaped war criminal, alters the direction of his own life and the fate of those with whom he casts his lot.

"Professor Preston at Home" by Elizabeth Corbett tells a story of the courtship and marriage of an aging and discontented college professor and a middle-aged widow of sunny disposition.

"A Mystery by Mignon Eberhart, 'Another Man's Murder,' and a western story by Lewellyn Holmes, 'Modoc; the Last Sunday,' conclude the list.

Kenneth Tucker Dies March 6 At Nyssa Home

Kenneth Moroni Tucker, well-known Nyssa man, died March 6 at his home following an illness of approximately nine months.

Mr. Tucker was born June 10, 1901, at Fairview, Utah. He is survived by his wife, Pauline Lavern; two sons and two daughters; Mrs. Lester Chase of Seattle; Mrs. Jimmy Johnson of West Point, Miss.; David Tucker of Seattle, and Danny Tucker, a senior at Nyssa high school; five grandchildren; 10 brothers and sisters; Carrol P. Tucker, Warden, Wash.; Velma E. Starkey and Thelma McBride of Salt Lake City; Lola May Campbell, Morgan, Utah; A. Reed Tucker and Pearl Erickson, Blackfoot; Enon Franson, Los Angeles, and Samuel Tucker of Nampa.

The Tuckers came to Nyssa in 1948 from Roslyn, Wash., and have made their home here since.

Mr. Tucker was a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, an MIA teacher, a ward teacher and a member of the Masonic lodge. He had been employed with the reclamation office of the North Board of Control for nine years.

Funeral services were held Monday, March 10, at 2 p.m. in the Nyssa Second ward, with Bishop Lloyd Lewis officiating. Interment was in the Nyssa cemetery under direction of the Nyssa Funeral home.
