

### Supt. R. V. Wilson Travels to Meet Of NEA Group

Superintendent of Schools R. V. Wilson returned last week from the four-day, 13th annual convention of the Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development, a unit of the National Education Assoc., in Seattle.

About 3,000 college and school superintendents, principals, directors and teachers from all 48 states and U. S. possessions attended the annual meet, Wilson said.

Wilson is a member of a study group in the association on mobilizing and using community groups to improve public education.

Nyssa's superintendent said the general conclusions of the meeting were that the American public wants a balanced educational program in their schools, especially in view of recent scientific developments such as the Sputniks.

The problems and means of identifying students were also discussed, Wilson said, as were student problems, community relations, the use of mass media for getting information to the public and the rising life expectancy and problems of all government bodies.

After the four-day session, Wilson said that Nyssa's schools appear to have an outstanding balanced program of compulsory and elective subjects for a small school system.

### Nyssans Donate Record Amount For Heart Fund

Nyssans contributed a total of \$406.63 in the 1958 Heart Fund drive conducted throughout the state during the month of February, Mrs. K. A. Danford, publicity chairman for the local campaign reported Tuesday evening.

This year's Heart contributions surpassed all previous drive records for Nyssa during the past five years, according to Mrs. Danford.

Women of the American Legion Auxiliary and nurses from the Malheur Memorial hospital cooperated in the Heart Sunday door-to-door visitations and canvassing of the business district which resulted in a grand total of \$329.88. The plastic heart canisters which were placed at various points throughout the downtown area netted \$6.75 and a donation of \$20 was received from the Emblem club.

The Legion auxiliary was credited with collecting \$231.73 and the Nurses association with \$98.15. Another \$50 was tallied from miscellaneous contributions.

An additional \$77.35 was collected for the Heart fund in the Arcadia district by members of the Arcadia Sunshine club.

A record of additional donations received in envelopes which were mailed to the local post office was not immediately available this week, as many had been forwarded to state headquarters, it was explained.

Dr. K. A. Danford has served as Nyssa Heart campaign chairman and Mrs. Danford as its publicity chairman for the past five consecutive years. This year's county drive chairman is also a Nyssan, Mrs. Harold Wilson.

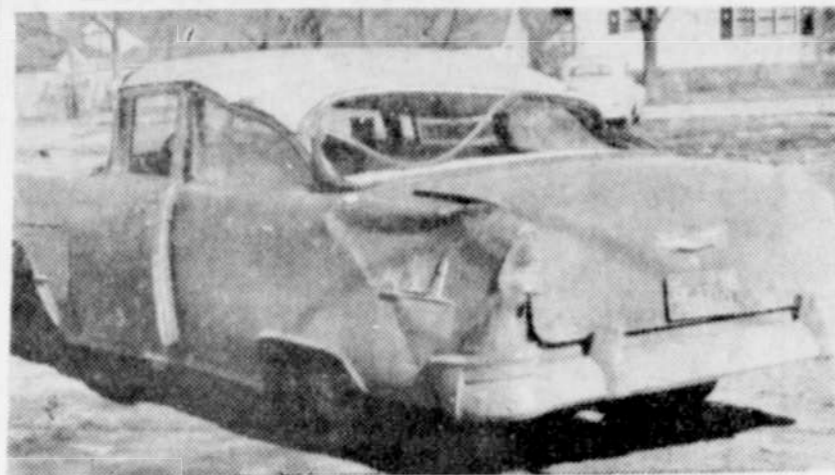

### State Income Tax Help Offered Next Wednesday

Assistance in preparing Oregon state income tax returns will be given by State Tax commission personnel at the city hall in Nyssa between 10 a.m. and 12 noon Wednesday, March 19.

Taxpayers wishing help in filing their returns are asked to bring earnings slips and other information necessary to determine the correct tax, including, if possible, copies of their federal returns for 1956 and 1957.

Because of the cutback in income taxes voted by the special session of the legislature, a record number of refunds is expected this year. To be eligible for a refund, a taxpayer must file a return.

The commission also emphasizes that if a joint return is filed, both spouses must sign it.
