"Seven Years' Solitary" by Edith Bone recounts an ordeal that ended with the 1956 Hungarian uprising. She is an ex-Communist who in 1949, after 30 years of party membership, was arrested and placed in solitary confinement.

"Reluctant Empire" by George Fuernmann could be called "The mind of Texas, 1946-56," says the author. It shows the state "in terms of mentality, politics and culture, of strengths and weaknesses" and tries to separate facts from mythical conceptions.

"Desert Happy" by Douglas Rigby tells of the fascination of the desert experienced by the author and his wife who spent a winter in Arizona.

Three books examine the situation of Israel and the Middle East: William Polk and two co-authors examine the struggle for Palestine through its history, economics and underlying emotional factors in "Backdrop to Tragedy." Harry Ellis in "Israel and the Middle East" studies the beginning, development and present status of the Palestine problem at the heart of which lies the unsolved Arab-Israeli feud. Alfred Lillenthal sees the Israel-Arab conflict as a part of the emergence of the Middle East in the power struggle between Communists and the West in his book "There Goes the Middle East."

"Into the Wind" by Mary Van Nes recounts the adventures, fun and perils of a family of eight in cruising from Long Island to Portland, Maine, on a 70-foot schooner.

"The Lunatic Fringe" by Gerald Johnson illuminates the careers of individuals whose ideas in their time seemed eccentric and controversial: abolition, woman's suffrage, social security, etc.

"Neither Black Nor White" by Wilma Dykeman and James Stokely depicts the turmoil and emotions of southern people on the desegregation controversy and the historical, economic and social background of the problem.

"Sojourn of a Stranger" by Walter Sullivan is a novel of the mid-nineteenth century South and of a young man of mixed racial parentage and the bitterness that was his until he settled down after the Civil war.

"The Faster They Go" by John Bentley is a novel of motor racing.

"Monsieur Yankee" by Leslie White is an historical novel about a young American doctor in France during the Revolution.

"The Landlooker" by William Steuber tells the story of a 15-year-old boy who in 1871 went with his brother on a selling trip into the wilds of Wisconsin.

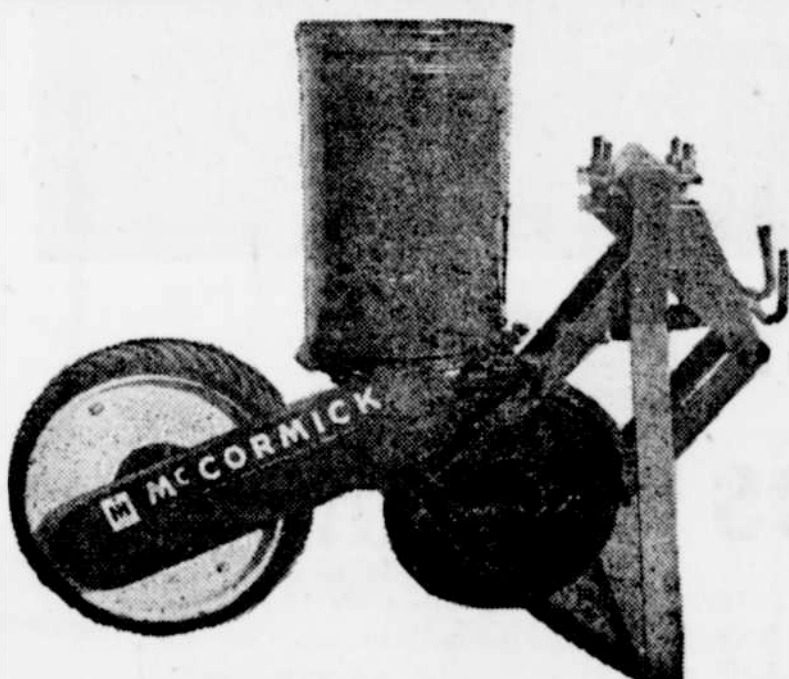
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
