4-H Summer School Shortened

We have just received word that 4-H summer school at Oregon State college will be cut from 10 days to a seven-day session. Rising costs have made it necessary to either cut the length of summer school or increase the cost

of scholarships. After considerable deliberation the state club office decided to decrease the number of days so the cost could remain the same.

Dates of this annual event have been set for June 16 to 22, inclusive. The Malheur delegation will leave here Monday, June 16, and return Sunday, June 22.

Incomplete returns from a questionnaire sent to scholarship sponsors indicate that we will have about 60 scholarships available this year. This will fill our county quota, as each county is limited in the number they can bring.

4-H club members over 12 years of age who wish to be considered for a scholarship to this summer school should turn in their applications immediately. They will also need to submit their folders containing their permanent 4-H club records. The scholarship committee of the Malheur 4-H club leaders will go over these applications and select scholarship winners early in April. Awards are made on the basis of the number of years in 4-H, number of projects carried, participation in activities and quality of work.

Livestock Brand Fee Costs Up

Livestock brand inspection fees in Oregon will be restored to 25 cents per head, effective April 1, according to the state department of agriculture's division of animal industry.

M. E. Knickerbocker, division chief, said the brand inspection service has been unable, due to rising costs and fewer inspections, to hold the line on the reduction to 20 cents made 16 months ago.

He said that when the fee was dropped to 20 cents on July 1, 1956, the fund carried a surplus of \$70,000. As of Jan. 31 this year, the account was in the red \$21,569.17.

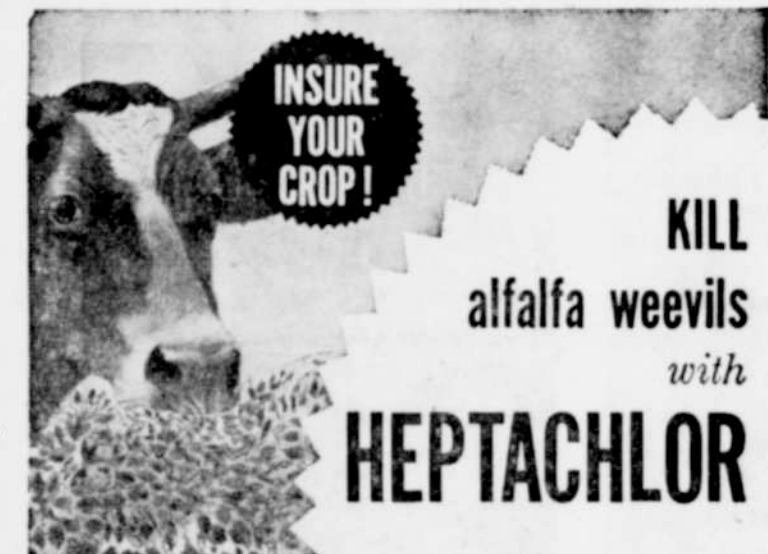

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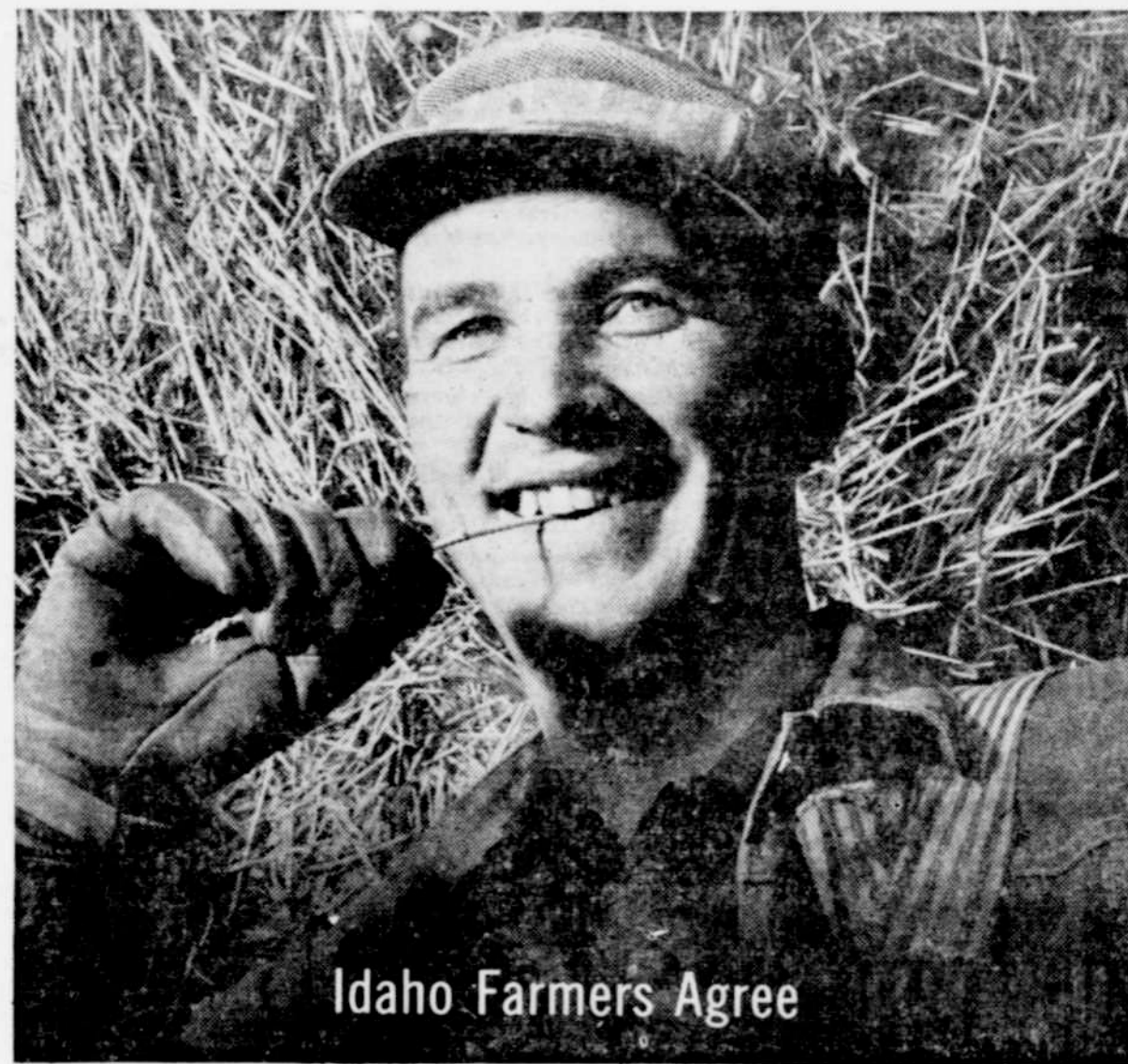
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Idaho Farmers Agree

"N" It takes N, men

Dick Giesler and his father, Mr. Harry Giesler, raise wheat, barley and other crops on their 1,800-acre farm at Fairfield, in Camas County, Idaho. And they use USS Nitrogen Fertilizer.
