Bulldogs to Launch 1958 Baseball Season Against Adrian Tuesday

Nyssa's Bulldog baseball squad was preparing this week for their first scheduled baseball game of the season against Adrian here next Tuesday and Coach Stan Olson says the team is coming along "real good."

Nine lettermen from last year's team are included in the 15 ballplayers out for this season's squad and Olson says the boys are ahead of where they were at this time last year.

Olson said the Bulldogs' hitting is still a little light, but if it improves their chances should be pretty good this year. He said the pitchers have looked good so far in practice.

The Bulldogs start off their pre-league play against a strong Adrian nine here at 3:30 Tuesday. The Antelopes were runners-up in state "B" league play last year and they have virtually the same team this year. Nyssa and Adrian will meet again next Friday on the Antelopes' field.

The state 7-A-2 playoffs are to be arranged for the first part of May. May 24 the state quarter-finals will be played, with the semi-finals on May 31 and the state championship on June 7.

Nyssa's frosh-soph squad, which just started practice this week, is slated to meet Vale here April 7, Parma here April 14, Adrian here April 21, Vale there April 28, Parma here May 5 and Adrian there May 12.

April 26 Opening Of Oregon's 1958 Trout Season Set

All you trout fishermen had better take another look at your calendar and start readying that fishing gear. Oregon's general trout season opens in just about a month, on April 26.

At a meeting earlier this year the Oregon State Game commission set the general trout season for April 26 through Oct. 31. The trout bag limit remains the same with 10 fish six inches or over in length permitted, but no more than 20 in a person's possession.

In addition to the streams and lakes opening April 26, Beulah reservoir, Warm Springs reservoir, Antelope reservoir and Delintment lake in zone 8—Malheur, Harney and the southeast corner of Grant counties—are open to trout angling the entire year.

The commission also approved the proposal to outlaw the use of minnows for bait, live or dead, in most waters of the state. However, the main stem of the Snake river is excepted from this rule.

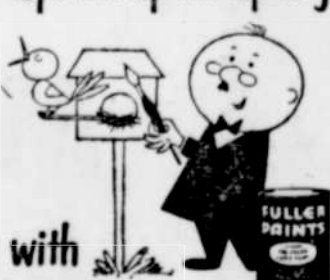
They are scheduled to appear on radio station KSRV between 1:30 and 2:30 p.m., it was announced.
