"Three Hundred Years of American Painting" by Alexander Eliot, art editor of Time.

"The Amulet" by Hal Borland. When the guns of Fort Sumter rolled a booming echo across the land in 1861, a sympathetic vibration shook far-off Denver. There, Quincy Scott, a Missourian, young and with an inner need to find truth and glory, joined a band of Southerners intent on reaching the Confederate forces.

County Library Announces Titles Of All Interests

America's DEW line, travel books on such different spots as the Louisiana bayous and Iran, plant propagation and hunting around the world are subjects heading the list of new books going into circulation Saturday, March 29, at Malheur county library.

"Dew Line" by Richard Morens concerns America's radar defense network across North Polar regions... the distant early warning system.

"Cajuns on the Bayous" by Carolyn Ramsey takes the reader into the beautiful and mysterious coastal land of the Louisiana bayou country in search of the ancestors of the Acadians romanticized in Longfellow's "Evangeline."

"The Last Migration" by Vincent Cronin describes the last spring migration of a nomadic Persian tribe from their wintering grounds of southern Iran to the mountain grasslands, after which the free life of the nomads was forbidden by government decree.

"Plant Propagation in Pictures" by Montague Free describes many ways of increasing the number of plants in home and garden, including grafting, layering and cutting.

"Shots Heard Round the World" by Ellis Briggs describes the hunting adventures of a U.S. ambassador on four continents.

"Gaslight and Shadow" by Roger Williams portrays the world of Napoleon III, 1851-1870, through sketches of 10 people of the period.

"Suez Story: Key to the Middle East" by William Longgood reviews the historical origins, planning and development of the Suez canal to the recent French-British-Israeli adventure in that area.

"Sandy Was a Soldier's Boy" by David Walker is a fantasy about a Highland boy who is caught at mischief but later proves himself by giving the alert on a surprise invasion of Scotland.

"The Mapmaker" by Frank Slaughter is a novel of the days of Prince Henry, the Navigator, who sailed 50 years before Columbus.

"Sailor Named Jones" by Harvey Haislip is an historical novel about the American naval hero, John Paul Jones.

"Thalia" by Olivia Parker is a story of an 18-year-old art student who comes to Brittany to be the companion of Colonel Pemberton's unhappy daughter, Thalia, and the tragedy which her few months there bring of the Pemberton family.

"Wilderness of Spring" by Edgar Pangborn is an historical novel of colonial New England and of two boys growing up after the Deerfield Massacre—one attracted to the sea and the other to science.

"O'Shaughnessy's Day" by Mary Deasy tells the story of Liam O'Shaughnessy's return from prison, freed by his father's death-bed confession.

"The Story of Walt Disney" is told by his daughter, Diane Disney Miller, with the aid of Pete Martin.

"The Case of the Daring Decoy" is a new Perry Mason mystery by Erle Stanley Gardner.

"The Temple of Gold" by William Goldman is a story of a young man involved in the problems of adolescence.

"Evangelism for Tomorrow" by Charles Templeton is a reappraisal of the church's mission to win modern man.

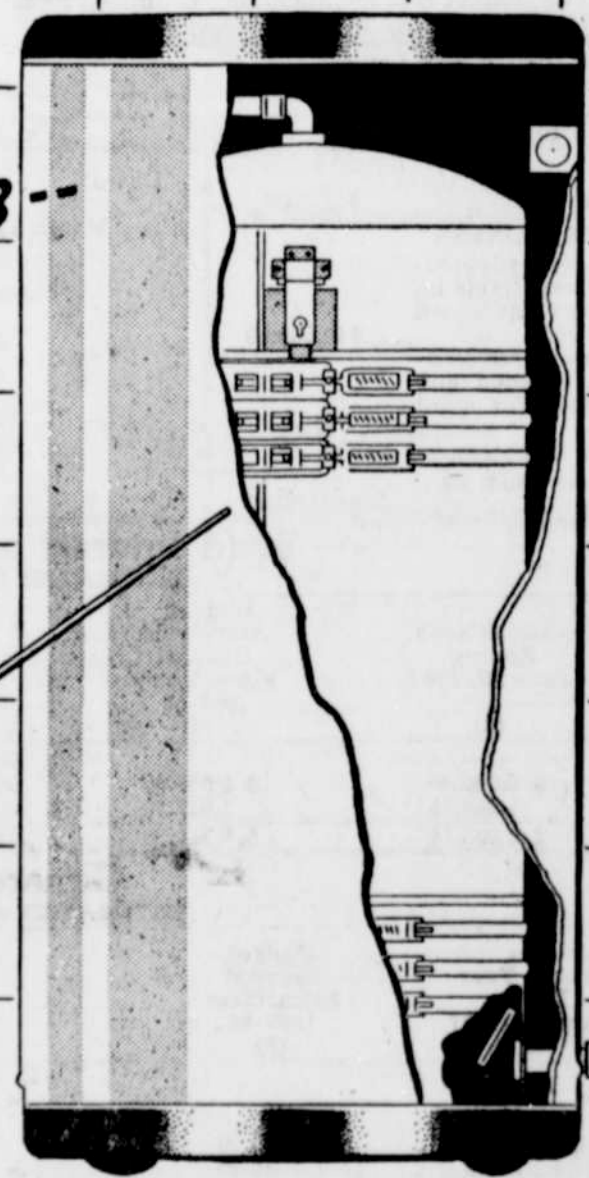
