Malheur County Concert Slates Last Musicale

The final concert of the current series of Malheur Community concerts will be presented April 11 when William Warfield will again perform in the Ontario high school at 8 p.m.

Born in the south, Warfield moved when he was a small child with his family to Rochester, N.Y., where his father sought better opportunities for education and livelihood. Today his father is pastor of Rochester's Mt. Vernon Baptist church, after studying for the ministry every spare moment while working also to support his family.

William Warfield, along with his brothers, was a member of the church choir. He also studied the piano, becoming highly proficient. During his senior year in high school, his classmates put on a play to raise money to sponsor his entrance in a competition of the National Music Educators league. He won first prize in this contest—a scholarship to Eastman School of Music. He earned his bachelor of arts degree there.

After serving four years in the military service during World War II he returned for his master's degree. Then in 1950 came his debut in New York at his Town Hall recital. This appearance catapulted Warfield into the ranks of the world's great singers. Offers poured in from everywhere—resulting in an immediate tour of Australia, followed by his appearance in "Showboat" as Joe. In the next five years he made 300 appearances.

His tours have included all major cities in Europe, Africa and the Near East.

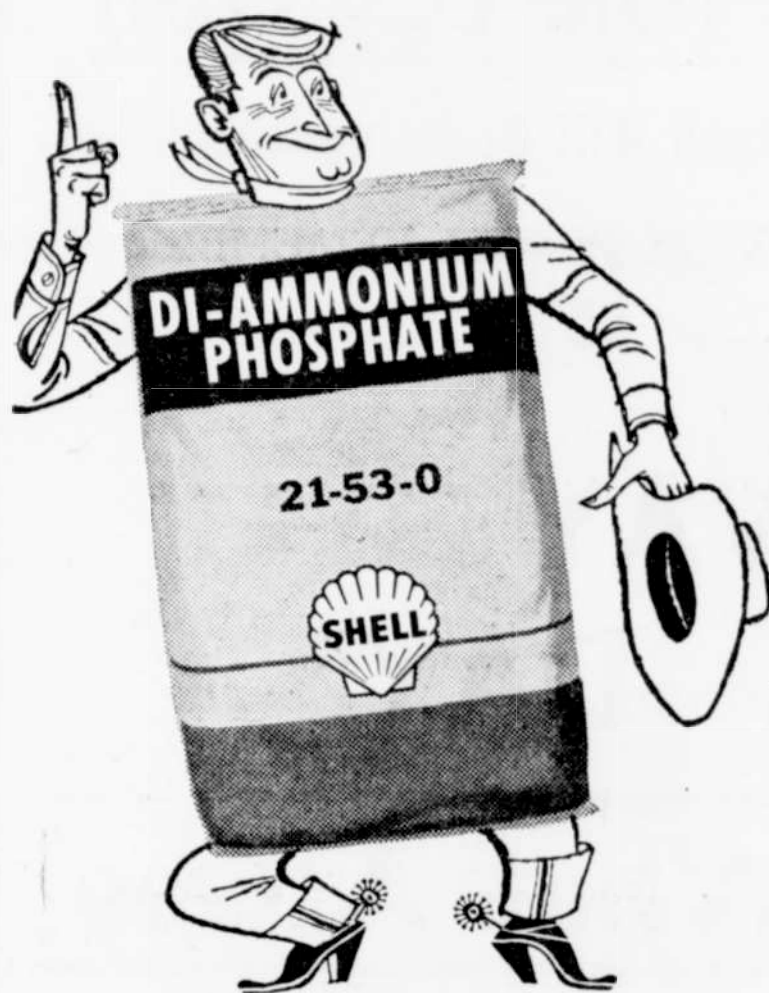
