## Timely Reports And New Novels Now Available

Timely reports on China and the countries of Southeast Asia, a new novel and interesting handbooks on homemaking and outdoor living are included among the books going into circulation Saturday, April 5, at Malheur county library.

"600 Million Chinese" by Robert Guilan is a report by one of two western correspondents who had visited China before. He was allowed to return and travel 20,000 miles over the country visiting modern China with its model Manchurian factories, model co-operative farms and regimented people.

"Southeast Asia Among World Powers" by Amry Vandenberg and Richard Butwell describes and analyzes recent events in Indonesia, the Philippines, Thailand, Malaya and Burma against their historical background.

"Time and the Hour" is a new novel by Howard Spring of the generation that grew up in the first world war only to be faced with the onset of a second.

"America's Homemaking Book" by Marguerite Dodd covers the topics of kitchen upkeep, marketing, laundry, house cleaning, household safety, financing, moving and many more.

"Gates of Fear" by Barnaby Conrad depicts the famous buildings of Spain, Portugal, France, Mexico and South America, with accounts of the matadors and bulls that made them famous.

"The Outdoor Encyclopedia," compiled by Theodore Kesting is designed for those spending their free time outdoors and includes material on sports of all kinds, pack trips, public lands and the weather.

"Yallah" by Paul Bowles is a book containing superb photographs by Peter Haeblerlin and describing the mysterious land of the western Sahara.

"A Man To Ride With" by Jack Farris tells the story of Chad Walters reclaiming of land left to him by his father, on which members of a poor, illiterate group called "gumbo rats" had settled.

"The Wise Children" is a novel by Christine Weston concerning a middle-aged widow who must cope with an alcoholic twin sister and a vindictive daughter.

"Pemberton, Ltd." by Geoffrey Davson is a story "of the determined struggle of a young man and his tyrannical elder cousin for control of a valuable family business."

"The Century of the Surgeon" by Jurgen Thorwald traces the march of surgery from the accidental discovery of Anesthetics through the pioneering operations of the 19th century.

"America's Colonial Heritage" by Patricia Acheson traces the varied paths of history that impelled colonization of the New World and drove the American colonists to fight for independence.
