WAR or PEACE?

How does the younger generation feel about military service and war?

In a recent youth group it became apparent that the terms "pacifist" and "conscientious objector" were unknown. The only interest shown was in questions of which is better, to enlist or wait for the draft and the merits of one branch of service compared to another. There seemed to be no moral issue involved.

To take a stand against military service was the same as desertion.

Richard Wilson and Jim Fish, students at the University of Arizona, Tucson, left Saturday after spending a week's spring vacation at the Barney Wilson home.

This lack of critical thinking is deplorable. There are basic Christian principles involved and they need to be considered.

1. Is killing in war a violation of the moral law? Are wars ever justifiable? Consider the moral let-down as covetousness, false witness, adultery and stealing rampant.

2. Is our ultimate allegiance to God or to man? Can a nation enslave the conscience of an individual?

3. The nature of modern warfare is such that the moral issues are complex and the goals are unattainable. War is not right vs. wrong: God vs. the devil.

4. The interpersonal relationships of community living are such that no person can refuse to play a part. Capital, labor and taxes are all involved in the preparation for and propagation of a war.

Having studied the pros and cons of international interests and tensions, one may decide that one can best perform his Christian duty by volunteering for military service. Each Christian's decision is his own, made in response to the love of God revealed in Jesus Christ.

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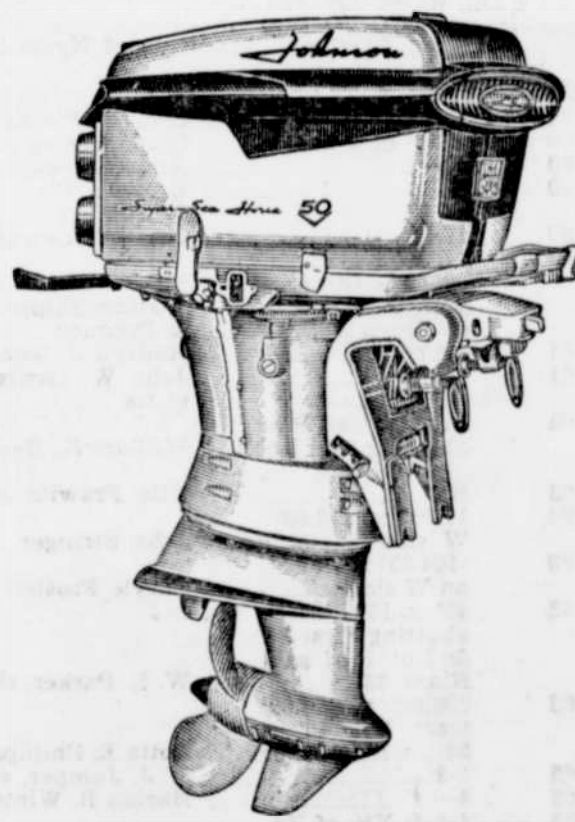
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
