### Dallas Duncan Dies Suddenly

J. Dallas Duncan, district horticultural inspector for the state of Idaho and former Nyssa resident, died suddenly Saturday, April 19, at Coeur d'Alene, Ida. He had been in failing health for the last six months.

Funeral services were conducted last Thursday at Nyssa Funeral chapel with interment in Nyssa cemetery.

Mr. Duncan was born in Vale June 16, 1894. While a small boy his family moved to Nyssa where he received his education and grew to manhood.

In 1914, he was married to Edith Pounds at Nyssa and moved to Boise in September, 1927, where he accepted a position with the state of Idaho in the bureau of plant industry. He was still employed by the state at the time of his death.

Mr. Duncan was a member of the IOOF lodge at Emmett and Eagles lodge of Coeur d'Alene.

In addition to his wife, Edith, he is survived by a brother, James A. Duncan of Bakersfield, Calif., and a sister, Bernice Keizer, Garden Grove, Calif.

### Two NHS Students To Attend Special Science Session

Two Nyssa high school students—Lionel Chadderton and Dennis Leavitt—will attend the third annual Junior Engineers' and Scientists' Summer Institute (JESSI) at Oregon State college in Corvallis from June 15 to 28, according to Charles Steffens, high school science instructor.

The JESSI program will provide additional training in science for the two, Steffens said, and the students maintained a high scholastic standing to make them eligible to attend.

The two-week session, sponsored by Scientists of Tomorrow of Portland, is a serious effort to have qualified students understand what the areas of scientific and engineering careers are about, what the various branches include, what is included in the college program of studies, with emphasis on the study demands of the technical areas, and what they should master in high school if they expect to be prepared to pursue the college program of their choice, Steffens explained.

### National Awards Tests Completed For NHS Juniors

Tuesday Nyssa high school juniors, next year's seniors, were all given a general educational development test as a part of the National Merit Scholarship program, according to Jack Jenkins, high school principal.

The tests were given at all participating schools throughout the country on this same date and will be machine scored by the National Merit Scholarship corporation, an independent non-profit organization sponsoring the program.

Four-year college scholarships are awarded the winners of the search for students who demonstrate extraordinary ability to benefit from a college education. A list of the top merit scholars is also compiled and made available to colleges and universities.

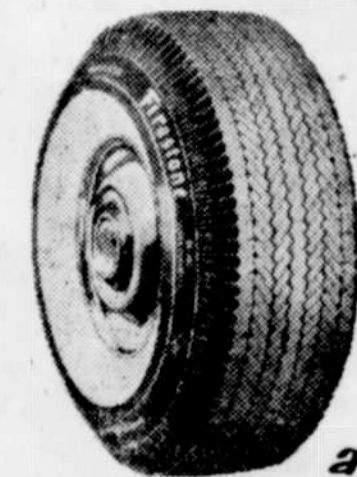

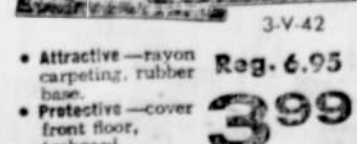

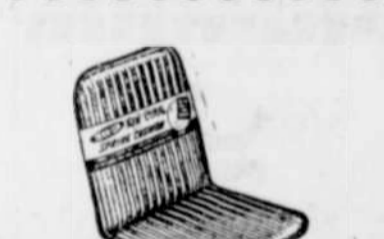
