

Nyssa Bulldogs Drop SRV, District Game to Vale's Vikings 6 to 2

Nyssa's Bulldogs suffered both an Oregon district and a SRV league defeat Friday when they dropped a single game to Vale here 6 to 2.

The game, which was classed as a SRV contest, was the first of a best-two-out-of-three elimination with Vale for the Oregon state sub district championship. Thus the Bulldogs were credited with a defeat in both divisions when they lost the single game.

Vale earned their win by coming through in the hitting department every time they managed to get men on the bases. They took the lead 2-0 in the second inning.

Antelopes Take Class "B" Title, Bulldogs Drop to Third in "A" During Sat. SRV Track Meet Here

Adrian's Antelopes swept first place in the class "B" portion of the SRV annual track meet Saturday in Nyssa while the Bulldogs, for the first time in Years, had to settle for a third place in the class "A" league.

Adrian, who took first place in "B" action with a high total of 46 1/6 points, won three track events, as did Homedale, while New Plymouth and Notus each won four events.

The Antelope win relegated last year's winner, Fruitland, to fifth place Saturday with only 17 points. Notus, in second place in the "B" meet, totaled 44 points for the day. Homedale had 26 5/6, New Plymouth 24, and Fruitland and Middleton tied with 17 each.

Weiser Wins Class "A"
In class "A" action Weiser knocked the Nyssa Bulldogs off their throne with a total of 45 points while the defending champs managed only 32 points, behind Ontario's total of 35. Emmett took fourth with 26 and Meridian and Vale tied for fifth with 13 1/2 points each.

Nyssa had one double winner for the day—Gerald Talbot who sped to victory in both the 100 and the 220 yard dashes. Weiser, however, won six first places in the day's events.

Adrian Wins
Events in which Adrian placed in class "B" competition included the 100 yard dash, Hartley second and Mendazona fourth; the 220, Hartley, second; the 440, Mills, second; the 880, Johnson, third; the high hurdles, McKinley, fourth; the low hurdles, Hatch, third; pole vaulting, Hammon, first, and McKinley, second; the high jump, Hammon and Thompson, tied with Homedale's Kirshner for first; the shot put, Zamora, first; the discus throw, Langley, fourth; broad jump, Webster, second; the 440 relay, the team of Webster, Hatch, Hartley and Mendazona took first; and the mile relay, Adrian, fourth.

The only event in which an Antelope failed to place was the mile.

Events in which the Bulldogs placed included the 100 yard dash, Talbot, first; the 220, Talbot, first; the 440, D. Walker, third; pole vaulting, Tucker, tied for second with Emmett's Hoath; the high hurdles, Tucker, second; discus, Savage, third; the high jump, Messick, third, and Moore, fourth; the mile relay, Nyssa, third; and the 880 relay, the team of Talbot, D. Walker, G. Walker and Roberts, first.

Thornton Clay, Notus hurdler, was treated at Malheur Memorial hospital for injuries suffered when he caught his foot on a hurdle and fell during the meet. His injuries were minor, however, and he was released after treatment.

Nyssa Appoints Bob Morford Football Coach

Bob Morford, Notus high school football coach for the past four years, was picked Monday to fill Nyssa's coaching position left vacant by the recent resignation of Stan Olson, according to R. V. Wilson, superintendent of schools.

Morford will serve as head football and baseball coach and assist in basketball. Harry McGinley, who has been coaching football, will replace Olson as basketball coach, assist Morford with football and continue to assist with baseball. In addition, Morford will be teaching boys health and physical education and general science.

Wilson said Morford was picked from 37 applicants for the position. As Pirate coach he has been one of the most successful coaches in the Snake river valley B league with a 28 won, five lost and one tied record.

Last year his Notus squad went through their nine-game schedule undefeated, winning the SRV-B title. In 1956 his team lost only

Nyssa Defeats Meridian 3-0 Tuesday

The Bulldogs marked up another SRV-A baseball victory Tuesday afternoon when they downed Meridian here 3 to 0.

Nyssa's first run, in the second inning, was unearned and scored on a wild pitch. In the fifth inning, pitcher Dave Sewright drove in two more Bulldog runs with a long single. Nyssa sewed the game up when, in the top of the seventh, they scored a double play with Jerry Myrick getting credit for an unassisted first out and an assist on the second.

Nyssa scored their three runs on six hits and made only one error. Meridian managed four hits and committed five errors. All 10 hits were singles. Sewright pitched the entire game for the Bulldogs.

Nyssa narrowed the margin in the fourth when Larry Roberts, who was on first, scored on Clark Jaques triple. However, Jaques was thrown out at home when he tried to stretch his hit into a home run.

In the fifth inning Vale added another run to lead 3-1. In the sixth, Jaques singled and then scored on a long fly by Chuck Rieb that bounced off the fingers of the Vale outfielder to make the score 3-2.

But in the seventh and final inning Vale racked up three more runs and Nyssa failed to score in the last half to leave the score at 6 to 2.

John Messick pitched for the Bulldogs until he was relieved in the seventh by Dave Sewright who came in and retired the side. Frank Hawley pitched the entire game for Vale.

Nyssa scored their runs on four hits, Vale their six runs on 11 hits.

Wilson said Morford's appointment leaves only one vacancy on Nyssa's teaching staff for next year, that of first grade teacher.

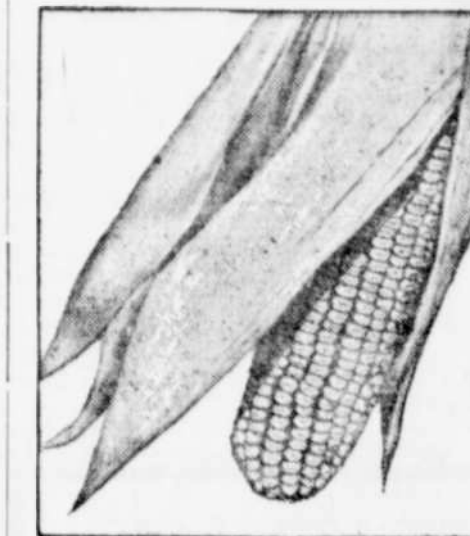
