Bangs Testing Drops in April

Brucellosis testing in Oregon range areas dropped in April as is normal at this time of year, the state department of agriculture reports. However, the vaccination of calves continued normally during the month.

During April 1798 herds containing 27,621 cattle were blood-tested for brucellosis. In this testing, 249 cattle reacted for a percentage of 0.902.

Nearly 500 herds containing an estimated 9840 calves were milk ring tested. Eight suspicious herds were disclosed.

Calf vaccination was conducted in 1032 herds containing 23,406 calves. More than 6000 cattle were tested at sales yards for movement back to the farms. Among these 30 reactors were found and sent for immediate slaughter.

Most of the testing in April was concentrated in Malheur, Douglas, Jackson, Lane, Baker, Grant and Umatilla counties. During the month, Baker, Lincoln and Polk counties were submitted to the USDA in Washington, D.C., for certification as brucellosis-free areas. The necessary papers were also submitted for recertification of Marion county.

Three tuberculosis reactors were found in 2938 cattle tested. The reactors were disclosed in cattle in Jackson, Josephine and Wasco counties.
