Nyssa's Bulldog trackmen swept Saturday's Oregon state 7-A-2 district track meet here by more than 15 points and qualified Bulldogs for 10 events in the A-2 state meet in Corvallis Memorial day week end.

Nyssa's took five first places in the 14-event meet. The strong Lakeview squad took six firsts and Madras took the other three.

Bulldogs qualifying for the state meet included Gerald Talbot and Don Walker in the 100-yard dash; Talbot in the 220; Norman Baker in the 880; Larry Roberts in the 180 low hurdles; Tim McGinnis in the mile; Jim Moore in the shot put; Monte Burbank, javelin; Danny Tucker, pole vault; Dennis Savage, broad jump; and D. Walker, Gerald Walker, Roberts and Talbot in the 880 relay.

McGinnis, Talbot, Baker and the relay squad all took first places in Saturday's meet. Savage, Tucker, Walker, Moore, Roberts and Burbank all took second place in their events.

Nyssa totaled 60 1/4 points for the district meet, Lakeview trailed with 45, Vale racked up 23 1/4, followed by Madras with 20 and Burns with 5.

Malheur Deer Count Shows 1958 Increase

Census trends were completed this past month on most of Oregon's mule deer ranges and show that plenty of the big sage jumpers will be around for the hunting seasons this fall.

An increase of about one deer per mile was noted throughout the 10 winter ranges in Malheur county, the Oregon State Game commission said.

In general, the tally shows slight over-all increases in deer per mile throughout all eastern Oregon, probably influenced by the extremely mild winter and a minimal winter loss, the commission explained. The only substantial winter losses were reported from winter ranges where critical food conditions exist.

Modest increases were also noted on four ranges in Harney county, while on two ranges—Alvord and Frenchglen—the counts were slightly below the 1957 tally.

The popular central area of Oregon shows a considerable increase in deer numbers from the 1957 tally with the exception of the Tumalo range where a small decrease was noted. The Devils Garden, Hole-in-the-Ground, McKay-Ochoo and other popular central ranges all showed substantial increases in the number of wintering deer.

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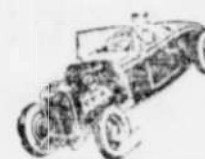

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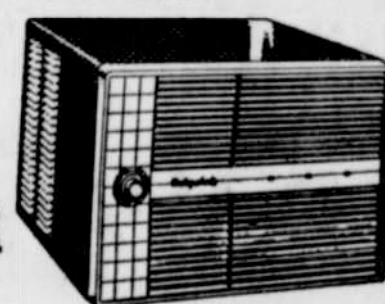
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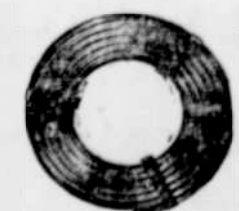
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
