About 20 persons from Nyssa, Vale and Ontario attended the meeting which was called by Gordon Capps, a member of the Governor's Centennial Advisory committee. Ken Renstrom, Elmer Cruson, Duane Alters and John Birrel attended from Nyssa.

Each of the three cities' Chambers of Commerce will appoint a representative to work with Standley in preparations for the county's participation in the centennial.

Plans were discussed for information and welcoming booths at the "twin gateways to Oregon."

Jersey Breeders Receive Honors At Spring Show

Nearly 100 Jerseys were entered in competition at the 13th annual spring Jersey show staged at Vale City Park last Saturday, Mrs. Irvin Hart, publicity chairman for the sponsoring organization, the Malheur County Jersey club, announced. A total of 34 animals were shown in the 4-H club classes, with Jay Johnson of Vale walking away with top honors for 4-H.

Trophies were evenly distributed to breeders of the county with Jim Phifer showing the senior and grand champion cow who was also judged first in her class and placed first in her udder class; Chester Clark, Ontario owned the reserve champion female; Irvin Hart & Son, Vale, the reserve champion bull and Lewis Johnson, Vale, the grand champion bull.

In the 4-H division, Gary Thompson of Nyssa had second place animal in the yearling class and 3rd in fitting and showing contest. Jay Johnson, Vale, placed first in senior fitting and showmanship, had the best dairy project exhibit and showed top animals in the yearling and cow classes. His brother, Dan took first in the junior heifer class.

Linda Taylor of Grove had the top Jersey in the senior calf class and second place in the junior calf class.

For FFA exhibits Jesse Kygar, Adrian won first place for a heifer under one year and took second in fitting and showing. His heifer was an eight-months-old Jersey, given by Mr. and Mrs. William Toomb, one of four awarded to a high school freshman FFA student in each of the Nyssa, Adrian, Ontario and Vale schools to start a dairy chain.

The three other FFA boys winning a heifer were Reed Patterson, Nyssa; Cecil King, Ontario, and Lynn Reagan, Vale. Their animals were presented by Mr. and Mrs. Howard Bair, Nyssa, Mr. and Mrs. Irvin Hart and Mr. and Mrs. John Hart of Vale.

Each 4-H member entering in the spring show received a silver dollar unless placing in one of the three top classes, Mrs. Hart reported.
