James Yosts Entertain At Couples Bridge Club

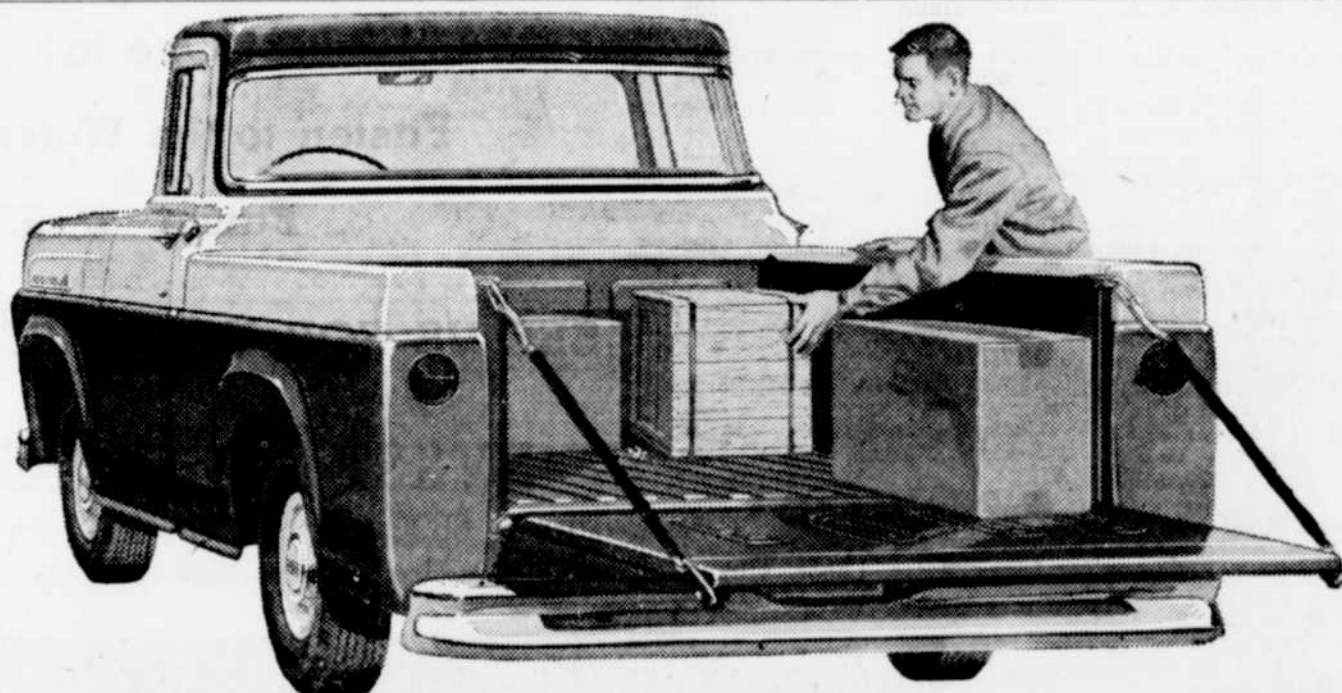

Plans for the annual ice cream social sponsored by the Ma-Pa group were made. Date of the event will be in July.



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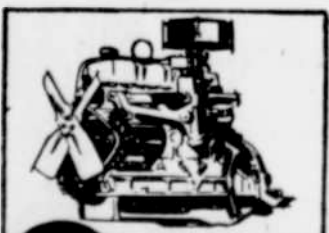
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2. Evenly apply JACK WILSON PELLETIZED CHLORO IPC-10 at the rate of 60 pounds per acre.
3. Promptly irrigate the field to activate the pellets. Dodder is a shallow germinator—irrigate lightly. Later, irrigate as usual.

B. Where no clipping is done ahead of seed crop...

1. Make close and frequent inspections of field to determine when Dodder starts to germinate. Keep a record by date of inspections. Inspect closely and often.

2. Time the application of pellets to coincide with the first germination of Dodder, or as soon thereafter as possible.

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
