Fahrenbruch was graduated from Adrian high school in 1955 and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Fahrenbruch, route 1, Nyssa.

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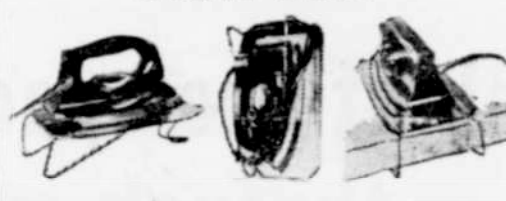
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
