

Adrian's Antelopes to Play Gaston In Multnomah Stadium Saturday For State Class "B" Championship

Adrian's Antelopes won the right to play for the Oregon state class B baseball championship in Portland's Multnomah stadium Saturday when they defeated Merrill's ball club on their own diamond Monday afternoon by a 3-1 margin.

The Antelopes will now play Gaston for the state B title for the second year in a row. Last year Gaston downed Adrian 4 to 3 in the championship game.

In Merrill Monday afternoon Antelope pitcher Phil Hatch allowed six hits but, with good Adrian defensive play, held them to only one run in the third inning. Hatch was the pitcher who allowed Athena only one run just five days earlier when the Antelopes downed them in the state quarter finals.

In all probability Hatch will also be the pitcher who will face Gaston Saturday night in Multnomah stadium.

Hatch also was the one who started the Antelopes to victory in the first inning Monday when he slammed on a triple to score Brent Hartley. Adrian added their other two runs in the second inning when Steve Sayre doubled, Sal Martinez walked and Hartley drove them both home with a single.

The Antelopes entered this year's Oregon state class B playoffs with a 7 won, 4 lost record for season's play. They finished SRV-B league play with 4 wins and 3 losses.

In their climb to the state championship game Adrian downed Huntington 4 to 0 for the district title and trounced Athena 11-0 for the regional crown before Monday's victory.

June Horse Race Set for June 11-14 At Ontario Arena

The 10th annual June race meet has been scheduled for June 11 through 14, inclusive, at the Ontario fairgrounds, according to Neil Dimmick, Nyssa. The meet is sponsored by the Snake River Valley Breeders and Racing association.

The race will see first running of Oregon-Idaho bred futurity two-year-olds. The association is promising a larger purse this year due to the fact a spring horse sale raised money for the annual derby's pocket.

Dimmick further stated that a larger group of better horses will be entered in the annual race meet, promising better races. Two quarter horse races will be held each day. Two-year-old futurity quarter horse races will be conducted daily.

The futurity purse will hold between \$400 and \$500 with an additional quarter horse purse.

The Malheur County Fairgrounds association has furnished materials for refacing the rails and necessities of upkeep on the grounds and volunteer workers from the Snake River Valley Breeders and Racing association have conducted the labor.

Nyssa Bulldogs Take Sixth Spot In State Meet

Nyssa high school's Bulldog track squad, which has been sweeping meets all season, slipped to sixth place in the Oregon state A-2 track meet on Bell field at Oregon State college Friday and Saturday. Some 58 Oregon high schools were represented at the annual meet.

The Bulldogs failed to take any "firsts" at the meet but did place second in two events and third in another.

Nyssa's 880 yard relay team—Gerald Talbot, Glenn Walker, Don Walker and Larry Roberts—took second in that event and broke the existing state record (as, of course, did the winners) with a time of 1 minute 33.5 seconds.

Talbot also took second in the 100 yard dash with a time of 10.3 seconds and third in the 220 with a 23.4 seconds.

Monte Burbank threw the javelin 167 feet to take seventh in that event and Dennis Savage jumped 20.4 feet in the broad jump for seventh. Danny Tucker pole vaulted 11 feet for tenth and Jim Moore threw 46 feet in the shot put (place not listed).

Sirloin Steak Styling



Dad will bask in glory on Father's Day. Service with a smile and a meal really worth while will consist of the day's highlights. The menu on this day features a broiled sirloin steak.

It won't be long now until the final countdown to Father's Day is here.

Special menu requests are always in order for this day. Of course, you needn't even ask. Dad's menu choice . . . chances are steak will be the answer.

If this is the case in your home, purchase a sirloin steak cut 1 inch thick.

Steaks—Selection, Preparation
Steaks for broiling are numerous . . . there's the porterhouse, T-bone, rib, club and top loin in addition to the sirloin. The sirloin can readily be identified by the thin narrow back bone,

comments Reba Staggs, meat expert.

When preparing this sirloin steak, simply set the regulator of the range for broiling. Place the steak on the broiler rack. Insert broiler pan and rack so the top surface of a 1-inch steak is 2 to 3 inches from the heat; a 2-inch steak . . . 3 to 5 inches from the heat. When one side is browned, season and turn and finish cooking on second side.

Time Table

A 1-inch steak requires 18 to 20 minutes for rare steak; 20 to 25 for medium. A 2-inch steak . . . 30 to 35 minutes for rare; 35 to 45 minutes for medium.
