Nyssa Schools Educate Youngsters, Develop Top-Flight Educators

For the second time in slightly less than four years a change is taking place in Nyssa's school system with the resignation of a superintendent who is able to advance in the educational field. Also for the second time, the local school system is being left in excellent hands with an outstanding successor being immediately named to fill the brief vacancy.

R. V. "Dick" Wilson, who has helped make the local school system—which serves a vast rural area and the city—one that is appreciated locally and throughout the state, will leave July 1 to assume the duties of principal at North Bend under Supt. Henry H. Hartley, his immediate predecessor at Nyssa.

The school board made a wise selection in Walter McPartland, a dedicated, energetic and thoroughly oriented educator who has been grade school principal at Nyssa for 14 years.

Residents of the Nyssa community missed Henry Hartley when he moved to North Bend four years ago, but they shared the satisfaction that he was stepping upward. Their confidence in Dick Wilson was not in vain as has been proved by the continued progress of the schools under his leadership.

Walter McPartland, or "Mac," is in the same category as was Dick four years ago—an educational leader in whom parents, patrons, the general public and most of all, the students, have the utmost confidence and respect.

The Journal is humbly grateful that it is among the vast majority of area institutions enjoying outstanding relationship with its local school system. The mutual understanding is directly the result of public relations constantly practiced by such men as "Henry, Dick and Mac" as well as by Jack Jenkins, high school principal. All four of them have set a pattern of human understanding, they have sought rather than rejected any criticism or differences of opinion from the public and they have never allowed any personal bias to creep into any part of the schools.
