Wheat Growers To Vote Friday On Referendum

Jack Smith, president of Oregon Wheat Growers league, urges all producers to cast their ballot Friday when growers will decide in a national referendum whether to accept marketing quotas will go into effect if approved by two-thirds or more those voting. Marketing quotas would apply to all 38 commercial wheat states.

If marketing quotas are approved, a producer who exceeded his farm allotment would not be eligible for price support and would be required to pay the penalty on excess production in order card. The minimum support of \$1.81 a bushel national average recently announced by the Department of Agriculture is 75 per cent of current parity.

Smith pointed out that producers should also realize that if quotas are defeated, the price support level would be approximately \$1.21 a bushel, which is 50 per cent of the July 1, 1959 parity. Farmers would still have to comply with acreage allotments to be eligible for price supports.
