

Nyssa Beetmen Down Boise 10 to 8 Tuesday, Now Lead Border League Standings with Four Won, None Lost

Nyssa's Beetmen, last year's Border league champions, pounded out three wins this past week and currently lead the league standings. The Beetmen came from behind Tuesday night to edge out Boise 10 to 8. They trounced Nampa 15 to 0 Friday night and Weiser 11 to 0 last Wednesday.

Boise started off their Tuesday night in Nyssa with four runs in the first inning. The Beetmen came back with seven in the fifth, but Boise countered with four more of their own in the same inning to lead 8 to 7. Nyssa, however, eked out one run in the sixth, one in the seventh and one more in the eighth to take the late-lasting contest 10 to 8.

Ray Barnes was the Beetmen's starting pitcher and was relieved by Tony Burke in the fifth inning. Burke received credit for the win, the Beetmen's fourth (against no losses) in league play.

Friday night in Nampa, behind Tony Burke's one hit pitching, the Beetmen soundly trounced Nampa's squad 15 to 0. The Nyssa team racked up impressive 15 hits in the clash with one each in the third and fifth innings, four in the sixth, two in the seventh, six in the eighth and one more in the final inning.

Frank Hawley led the local hitting with three for four times at bat, followed closely by Larry Bates who hammered out three in five. The lone, belated Nampa hit was a single in the ninth inning.

Last Wednesday night the Beetmen shut out Weiser 11 to 0 with coach Dwight Dickie pitching a one-hitter. The Nyssa team racked up 12 hits to Weiser's 1. Rich Wilson led the Beetmen's batting with 2 hits and three runs for four times at bat. Ron Bates slammed out two for five and scored two times.

After Wednesday night's contest the Beetmen batting averages looked like this: L. Bates, 1,000 with 6 for 6; R. Bates, 385, 10 for 26; Bishop, 500, 1 for 2; Hale, 375, 6 for 16; Wilson, 364, 4 for 11; Bowen, 357, 5 for 14; Messick, 666, 2 for 3; Howley, 313, 5 for 16; Dickie, 286, 4 for 14; Schenk, 286, 4 for 14; Barnes, 250, 2 for 8; Simianer, 210, 4 for 19; and Burke 0 for 4.

Nyssa's hitting was led by McCrady with two for three and Jacques slammed out a triple in the sixth inning.

Nyssa was to meet Vale there last night and will be playing back on the local high school field again Saturday night when they will again meet Vale. Both contests start at 8:30.

Hatch pitched a no-hit game to down the Gaston squad in a game that was called, because of the wide margin, in the bottom of the fifth inning. He issued two walks to mar a perfect game and permit the Greyhounds their two runs. The Antelopes hammered out 11 hits. Hatch started the scoring with a double, driving in leadoff man Mike Sillonis in the first

inning. Adrian broke loose for five more runs in the second inning with the help of three Gaston errors and Hatch again contributed a two-run double.

The championship win gave the Antelopes an 11 won, 4 lost record for the season. In state playoffs they downed Huntington 4 to 0 for the district title, trampled Athena 11 to 0 for the regional crown and edged out Merrill 3 to 1 for the opportunity to meet Gaston again this year in the championship game. Last year they worked their way up in the state playoffs only to be defeated by Gaston in the title game.
