Local Welfare Payments Rise; Unemployed Less

Malheur county's public welfare payments for last month increased approximately \$1,325, nearly 4 percent, over April of this year and some \$2,800, more than 9 percent, over May of 1957, according to Ray Myrick, Jr., county public welfare administrator.

Of a total of 358 cases receiving financial aid in May, 19 less than in April, only 24 were based primarily upon unemployment. This was a decrease of 21 unemployment cases from the preceding month.

A total of \$32,686.27 in financial assistance was granted through the Malheur county Public Welfare commission during May, according to Myrick. He said that it is primarily the increasing requirements for medical care and services of persons eligible for public aid that are causing the expenditures of the local welfare agency to remain consistently high.

Assistance totaling \$18,889.71 was expended in behalf of the 224 cases based upon age. Some \$6,366.28 was granted to 52 cases based upon the dependency of children, including 125 in their own homes and nine in foster family care.

Fifty-seven cases based upon disability received \$5,098.89 and the county's only blind recipient received \$40. Expenditures for the 24 cases based primarily upon unemployment totaled \$2,291.39.

ing child welfare matters, pending cases and contacts in behalf of other agencies, received individual attention but no financial aid through the local department. Fifty-seven cases were also closed or denied during the month because of ineligibility.

The costs for medical care of eligible recipients increased \$3,000 over the preceding month, Myrick said, to \$11,796.38, or more than a third of the total expenditures, which more than accounted for the rise in total monies spent.

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
